Our fellowship room is large enough hold all of the congregation and visitors after service, and is an inviting place to get to know strangers or catch up on news with friends over coffee, tea and snacks.

Our membership committee follows up with visitors in an effort to provide them with information they requested and also to help us better track how welcoming we are as a congregation. Can we do more? Can we do better? I am sure we can. I am certainly aware that I can do a better job when I stand up at the front and welcome everyone before Sunday service. On a few occasions I have forgotten to invite visitors to stand and introduce themselves. Hopefully I won't forget again. FESCO NEWS

The promised changes in the governance structure of the Family Emergency Shelter Coalition are now being translated into major Bylaws modifications. As always, the devil is in the details, so this process will take awhile, but there is no serious disagreement about FESCO's future direction. There will be a smaller Governing Board to take care of legal matters and the budget, and a larger Coalition Board to meet FESCO's other needs. Members of the Coalition, of which SKUU is one, will be expected to participate in at least three significant efforts to support FESCO. The SKUU Board will decide the ways in which SKUU will participate.

It is hoped that these changes will make it easier to recruit new Coalition Members, and also make it easier for representatives to understand and fulfill their role. If you are aware of a business, congregation, or service organization that might be fruitfully approached about joining FESCO as a Coalition Member, please tell me.

As you know, FESCO had a very difficult last year. Cate Steane, the Executive Director wrote a gripping description of just how bad things were, and the process by which FESCO pulled through. It was published in an on-line zine for non-profit organizations called Blue Avocado. I think you'll find it a good read. I wish I could say that FESCO is now completely out of the woods, but that's not true. Expenditures have been pared as far as possible without endangering the mission. Unfortunately, both government and foundation funding remain markedly lower than in the past, so community support from individuals continues to be needed to make up the shortfall. I know the SKUU congregation members can be counted on to support FESCO's work in moving homeless families toward independence. The Coalition does what we can't do alone.

How to Convert Any Toilet to a Low Flush Toilet

Toilets use the most water in our homes. Every day, Americans flush 4.8 billion gallons of water down the toilet. Reducing the amount of water that your toilet is flushing away will go a long way to saving water in your home and helping to conserve it generally. With one easy adjustment, you'll save money, water and the environment... one flush at a time.

Fill a half gallon container. A plastic bottle (juice/milk) is ideal. Remove any paper or plastic label on the outside of the container. Fill it at least partially with pebbles, sand, or gravel - whatever is handy. Then add water if more weight is needed. If you just fill it with water, though, the container will move around in the tank and interfere with the mechanism.

Place the container in the tank of the toilet.

Carefully lower it into the water.

Replace the lid of the tank.

Flush away. The New York Times reported that a sealed half gallon container will save half a gallon on each flush. If you, like most Americans, flush 5 times daily, your family of 5 will save 350 gallons (1325 liters) of water every month. These savings will significantly cut your water bill, too.
