For this celebratory service of dedication, I feel grateful to welcome my dear friend and former minister of the church I attended in Denver, the Rev. Dr. Stephan Papa. Stephan now serves the Unitarian Universalist Association as a special assistant to the President for fundraising. He travels extensively, visiting congregations and reminding them of the importance of stewardship to the larger association. There will be a ribbon cutting, a bench dedication, community guests and a festive reception. I'm looking forward to our congratulatory event.

Let us celebrate the vision and challenge that led us to build this house of peace. Let us acknowledge and appreciate the tradition, the institution that has brought us this far. Let us seek to discover together what we are called to become.

Why We Sing Together Intern-al Combustion

The second week of February, the Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association gathered for a week in Pacific Grove for the Excellence in Ministry Institute. This event is the first of what will hopefully be an ongoing series of continuing

education opportunities for Unitarian Universalist ministers. Katie and I were both fortunate to be able to attend.

For my week by the ocean, I chose to attend the "Building A Vocal Community" seminar led by Ysaye Barnwell. Dr. Barnwell is a Unitarian Universalist and one of the members of Sweet Honey in the Rock, the Grammy award-winning African American female a cappella ensemble. She is the author of two of the songs in our *Singing the Journey* hymnal: *Breaths* and *We Are*. Music is a critical part of meaningful worship, and I was thrilled to be able to study with Dr. Barnwell.

Here's what it was like: we didn't use a hymnal. We didn't use sheet music at all. We didn't even use words projected onto a screen. We stood in a circle so we could see each other. We listened to Dr. Barnwell as she would sing an opening line, her invitation for us to join her. And then we responded, keeping our eyes on her and on each other, keeping our ears open to hear each other. We didn't try to all sound the same. And we didn't try to sound perfect, creating some idealized version of each song. We weren't a choir. We were a community.

It was a powerful experience.

José Antonio Abreu is a Venezuelan musician, activist, and educator. He observes, "An orchestra is a community where the essential and exclusive feature is that it is the only community that comes together with the fundamental objective of agreeing with itself. Therefore the person who plays in an orchestra begins to live the experience of agreement."

That experience of agreement is undoubtedly part of the power and joy of singing together.

Abreu goes on: "And what does the experience of agreement mean? Team practice, the practice of the group that recognizes itself as interdependent, where everyone is responsible for others and the others are responsible for oneself."

It seems to me, then, that singing together is an affirmation of two of our Unitarian Universalist principles: the inherent worth and dignity of every person—for each voice has its part to sing—as well as the interdependent web of all existence, the recognition that each voice depends on the others.

No wonder singing is such a significant part of our worship life.

"Ministry is the act of serving. Shared ministry is what "we" do to serve our congregation and the broader community, individually and together" – definition of shared ministry developed at the January 2009 Board Retreat.

This past January, we had a joint retreat between the Board of Trustees and the Committee on Ministry (COM). To my knowledge, this was the first time these two groups have done this together.

Before the retreat day, we all were assigned some reading in "Churchworks", a great book on church governance by Anne Odin Heller. That day we had a productive time discussing our roles in the church within the context of shared ministry.

One important outcome from the meeting was a better understanding between the Board and the COM. I think that it is safe to say that most of us have had little formal training in church leadership and what we have received has been through the "on the job training" method. As a result, there are a lot of gaps in our knowledge about what different groups do within the church. The discussion that day helped clarify both the Board's and the Committee on Ministry's functions and responsibilities. Let me share some of that knowledge with you.

The Board of Trustees is made up of elected members who together constitute the executive body of the church. It is this group's responsibility to consider and make decisions involving congregational vision, mission, and policy. In addition, the Board is entrusted by the congregation to make financial and legal decisions for the church. This means that the President, Vice President, Treasurer and the rest of the Board have a fiduciary duty to keep the church legally and financially safe by making the best decisions they can. This can be a heavy responsibility and one the Board takes seriously.

While I think that most members of the congregation have some idea about the Board's duties, many members know less about the activities of the Committee on Ministry. This committee is different from any other committee in the church. First, unlike most other standing committees, the members of the COM are jointly appointed by the Board and the Minister. The COM does not answer to the Board, but is responsible with the Board and the Minister for supporting, monitoring and assessing the health of our church-wide ministry. The COM meets monthly with the minister to discuss issues which impact our congregation's spiritual health. This kind of work requires deep honesty and candor among the members of the committee, and for this reason the meetings are usually confidential. That being said, members of the congregation may bring issues of concern to the COM for discussion, advice and facilitation.

One important outcome from our joint Board/COM retreat was a better understanding between the two groups on how we can work together to assess our church's health. Our COM is in a unique position to know what is and is not working within our congregation, and they have agreed to share their assessments with the Board at least annually. Their feedback should help the Board do a better job of serving the needs of the congregation on all levels.

So, stay tuned. This is a new beginning. Future columns will discuss how the Board, COM, clergy, staff and the congregation, can work together to strengthen our ministry within and outside of our church.

Religious Exploration Walking in the Garden of Religious Exploration

As the sun shines brightly across our Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church campus. I am reminded of the growth we have been going through both inside and outside the building. After the heavy rains of February, this month will bring exciting changes to our landscape and we are making space for trees to stretch branches, for new leaves to unfurl, for flowers to bloom.

This spring, the Religious Exploration Council and I are making plans for changes in the coming year. We are beginning to explore what it would look like to divide our FUNShops into two groups, one for early elementary and preschool-aged children and one for elementary-aged children who can read. For the younger group, we will keep the FUN Shop model and for the older kids, we are looking at curriculum that would support their spiritual growth and exploration. I look forward to keeping parents, guardians, and members informed of the curriculum we decide on.

Last month, I received the good news that the Pacific Central District will be going forward with a Coming of Age Program in the upcoming year. For those of us who aren't familiar with this program, it is designed to teach high school and middle school youth about what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist and what it means to become a member of the church. This year, the youth have been learning about multiple faith traditions and have been visiting different places of worship. It has been exciting to think about how their current programming will support taking a look at one's own faith and learning about the history of our tradition.

For both of these new programs, we will need as much congregational support as possible. The Coming of Age Program requires regular teachers as well as mentors willing to meet with the youth about 4-5 times throughout the year. We will also need a group of about four adults to staff the new curriculum-based class for the older elementary kids.

Coming from this past month's worship theme of "Standing on the Side of Love", I am confident that the expansive love of this congregation is big enough to hold these programs and support our youngest church-goers. FESCO NEWS by Nancy Harrison: BKUU Representative to FESCO Board

Family Emergency Shelter Coalition

Receives Top Food and Shelter Award 2010 FESCO Honored as the Only Recipient in the East Bay

Hayward, CA – January 24, 2011 – The Family Emergency Shelter Coalition (FESCO) today announced that it has been named a 2010 Food and Shelter Award recipient for the second consecutive year. FESCO is one of only 76 nonprofits nationwide to receive the award sponsored by GreatNonprofits.org, which began the award to raise awareness of highly-rated nonprofits.

FESCO's mission is to help homeless families move to self sufficiency. Services include mental health counseling, money management classes, and cooking classes, to name a few. The program is designed to help clients become stable and self reliant. Two-thirds of FESCO residents are children; 46% of these children are five years old or younger. Still, on any given night there are over 1,000 homeless children in Alameda County.

GreatNonprofits.org publishes ratings and reviews of nonprofits nationwide. Reviews and ratings are given by volunteers and clients—those most affected by the organizations—creating an unbiased resource for potential volunteers and donors. The site does not remove negative reviews. Users can rate more than 1.2 million nonprofits at GreatNonprofits.org.

"This award is very gratifying because it's based on the experiences of the formerly homeless families we have served as well as the volunteers whose efforts make our work possible," said FESCO executive director Cate Steane. "Greatnonprofits.org and this award help raise awareness about our work, which is important now more than ever as government funding for safety net services dries up making it critical that we add monthly donors."

For a small committee in a fairly small **JUUST SOCIAL CHANGE** congregation JUUst Social Change has been involved one way or another in active participation in a wide variety of social change issues over the years. My personal involvement began before I actually was a member of Starr King Church. In the 1960's there were a lot of societal challenges going on. It seemed that at most every meeting or march there were people from Starr King, at that time a fellowship, right on the front lines. That is what brought me to this congregation that walked the talk so to speak. Over the years we have been involved in local organizations like South Hayward Parish and FESCO with other churches. On the broader front we worked with East Bay Sanctuary Covenant to help provide amnesty for Salvadoran refugees threatened by death squads in their own country.

For a number of years we have worked directly and indirectly on health care reform and we are strongly committed to the single payer concept for California. As California goes so may go the nation. Civil rights and gay rights have long been a passion. Currently immigration and the plight of undocumented workers is something our committee hopes to be able to seek solutions for. We also are aware of the need for help for Haiti after its devastating earthquake.

The seven principles are pretty much our guiding philosophy as we pursue the myriad social needs that confront our community, our nation, and our world. One advertisement says no job too big or too small. Some jobs are too big to tackle alone but with all your good will we'll make a dent.

Starr King UU Church in Hayward, CA partnered with Hayward Community Gardens to help low income immigrant families use plots to grow their food in a variety of

ways.

One of the first ways that they got involved with Hayward Community Gardens was Renee & Darryl Ray, Starr King members, taught a composting workshop on April 25, 2009 for the community gardens. At the workshop they were able to give out water timers and 20 Biostack composting bins due to a donation from the City and StopWaste.org. Interpreters were there for the Spanish speaking community. Starr King also got donations of 150 tomato plants from a local organic farmer. Sandy Frost, a Hayward Community Garden board member and volunteer helped to organize the workshop as well as supplying a wonderful local food spread. Because the workshop was so successful, it was offered again in May and August of 2009.

Starr King participated in two volunteer workdays in 2010. The first workday they helped to measure each of the 200+ plots to help determine what each member should pay for their plots. The second work day, strong workers helped to build big compost piles. With manure donations, clipped leaves and branches from their property and bales of straw, workers built three compost piles. The compost has helped to enrich soil, save water and improve crops.

Then, Starr King member Terry Hunt was commissioned by the City of Hayward to make a series of seven park benches depicting the diversity and history of Hayward. Because of Starr King's commitment to Hayward Community Gardens, he specifically made one in their name. The benches serve a meaningful reminder of how important this community garden is. They will be spread throughout Hayward, and, with the Hayward Community Garden bench included, will make the community more aware of the gardens.
