A number of years ago when I was perusing the bookstore shelves in search of a new journal, I was encouraged to choose the one without lines. But the lines are there to keep my handwriting neat, I protested, so that it doesn't slope down the page or get smaller or larger. The lines help keep me on task, with each page matching the one before. Those line-less books are for drawing, not writing!

When I was at the halfway point of my internship year, my teaching minister told me that I had spent enough time on the "doing" of ministry and I now needed to focus on the "being" of ministry. How to *do* that? That was the more difficult half of the year.

Never a fan of the 50's sitcom *I Love Lucy*, I somehow keep seeing that scene of Lucy and Ethel trying to please by wrapping chocolates passing at an incessant pace, finally shoving them into their necklines, hats and squirrel-cheeked mouths.

Where is there room for creativity when the belt is speeding by? How can I practice ministry when there's no space for reflection? How can we have vision when all the pages are already lined out for us?

Not many vocations have what feels like the luxury of a sabbatical. Ministry is one of the few. Yet, as I prepare for a time of rest, a time to "rest and let the ground lie fallow" I know that room will be created on the page, the conveyer belt will decelerate, the mind and heart will find room for the being.

On my sabbatical, on which I will mostly stay close by and focus on my love of music, I will strive to find ways to bring more creativity to our vocal community. For this four-month period from January through April, I've got plans to take lessons, and for doing a bit of research, but mostly, I want to make room on my page to let the spirit move me. I hope that during the time I'm gone, you'll do some exploration of your own, whether that's in new insights from worship, taking on a new role at church or finding your own creative voice. I will share more details about the sabbatical in worship, and the sabbatical committee is taking every measure to make sure details are in place so that things run smoothly while I'm gone. In May, when I return, we can share with each other all that we've learned.

In the meantime, I'm going to try to consider my blank page (no lines), the importance of "being" in ministry, and the fact that more chocolates pass me by than I could ever manage, as good examples for my creative spirit. To "hail a new creation," I need room for the old to pass away and for everything to become new.

I'm writing this "October article" on September 11th, 2011, in accordance with our Flaming Chalice submissions deadline. As may be true for you, I've been giving extra thought in the last few weeks to how I wanted to engage this special day. It is the tenth anniversary of a painful bookend in history that in some ways divided our lives "before the Twin Towers fell" from what living has been like afterwards.

Frankly, I've been wary of this anniversary; I didn't wish to ignore or avoid *reflections* about 9/11/01 and yet I felt a shrinking disinclination to relive the *shock and grief* I felt that day. I recently heard a psychologist on National Public Radio say that she was aware of no data indicating that revisiting those vivid images of destruction would be therapeutic. That suited me just fine, and miraculously, I've managed to get through the last few weeks without seeing the Twin Towers fall on television or the internet.

How wonderful it was, then, to be with many of you at our Starr King worship service this morning and listen to Rev. Katie's compassionate and perceptive sermon describing how the trauma of the 9/11/01 attack weaves into the fabric of life, including other life-traumas. She seemed to me to be saying that compassion requires us to be ready to comfort one another and ourselves *in an inviting way* when trauma is evoked, as we can't always know what other painful memories will emerge. I also took comfort from the good old hymn *There is a Balm in Gilead*, which reminds me that discouragement will come but that succor will also come, and that it *doesn't matter* if I don't know the answers or can't see my way, so long as I can keep compassionate love at the center of my endeavoring.

And what a seeming MULTITUDE of happy, engaged kids were with us at worship today to enjoy Irene Boczek Stefanko's delightfully hand-crafted story about creating life and beauty where once there was waste and bleakness.



It was SO NICE to have our Fall Barbeque & Potluck this afternoon, too! This event seems always to be so happy and relaxed. I even saw a first-time Starr King visitor stay for the potluck, which made me feel great. Thank you to the efficient planners, volunteers and participants who made this pleasing, friendly communion possible.

I'm grateful to live in our special Starr King community. I hope you also are finding congregational life satisfying. Religious Exploration

G.K. Chesterton said "Education is simply the soul of a society as it passes from one generation to another." While I view the religious education or exploration as a collaborative adventure, these words remind me how the present and future are connected in the Religious Exploration (RE) program here at Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church. I am also so grateful to Rev. Katie, the RE Council, those who build fences to keep the children safe, and all of the volunteers who teach and care for our children with such tenderness. This passing of the soul isn't possible without them.

Currently we are offering 3 programs. First, child-care is offered for infants and toddlers during Sunday services by wonderful loving volunteers. In order to properly plan, we ask that you sign up at <http://www.signupgenius.com/go/infanttoddler> on the Friday before a service to let us know if you will have a wee one in childcare on Sunday. Similarly if you would love the chance spend time with littlest ones, you are always welcome as a care-giving volunteer.

For the pre-school and school-age children we just finished an incredible month of FunShops. We explored the interconnected web of existence by studying Ladybugs, we thought about feelings on 9/11, we made bubbles knowing that one source of wisdom is experience, we learned about the many different ways we communicate via music and rhythm, and we learned about community at an ice cream social. Either last month, or over the course of last year, many in the congregation offered their wisdom to the children via FunShops. Our deepest gratitude to you all.

On September 27, 2011 we started this years RE program for pre-school and school age children. We will be offering a curriculum for the children called Principles for UU and Me modified for the particular needs of this congregation. During this school-year, the children will explore the UU principles with their minds, their hands, and their hearts. Throughout the year we are planning on many field trips and social justice projects. We hope that you might come and learn with us. During the first month of the program the children will be introduced to the seven UU principles and then the second month we'll dive right into the 7th principle -- respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part. On October 23, families who are interested can join us at the Hayward Shoreline Interpretive Center so that we can commune with the wet part of the interconnected web of existence. And on November 6, the Insect Discover Laboratory will be visiting us here at SKUUC so that we can get up front and personal with the some of the insects in the great web!

Last, we talked with the Youth to introduce them to the religious exploration opportunities available in the district and to talk about what they would like to do together during the next year. SKY, the youth program will begin on October 2, 2011. Youth are asked to sign up each week at <http://www.signupgenius.com/go/areyou7> if they plan to come so we'll know who's coming and can plan properly. The emphasis this year will be on UU history and social justice.

So we're off to a grand start in Religious Exploration and one last ENORMOUS thank you to the entire congregation for making that possible.

WHY I DONATE MY FOOD

I was drowning in squash, and it got to the point where people saw me coming and said, "No more!" The Green Sanctuary mentioned the Urban Orchards program through South Hayward Parish. They will come glean my fruits and vegetables, or I could deliver it to them. This fresh, local produce, along with other food collections, helps to feed the needy.

I decided to drop off my patty pan squash. I called, and they said, "Sure, bring it in!" When I got there I saw two ladies in the parking lot comparing their bags of groceries. I walked around the corner to find a long line of elderly people sitting, waiting for their bags. A helper there took one look at my squash and, said, "Oh, those are different. They look like flying saucers!" We laughed, and he proceeded to take them to the food pantry. I noticed the shelves did not have much in the way of canned goods.

I was so moved by this encounter, and as I drove away, I thought, maybe they take eggs! I pulled over, called them back, and told them about our fresh farm eggs. They said, oh yes, they would take them. Then I thought about our eggs that we are selling. Sometimes our customers cannot pick up their eggs, and have arranged for others to get them. I sent an email to them and mentioned this program. If they could not pick up their eggs on a particular week, we would be happy to "donate" their share to the Urban Orchards program.

The response was so positive! They were happy to have this option, knowing that it was going to a good cause. This week I am taking some chard, collards, beans, and corn, and next week we already have some eggs that are being donated by our customers.

So, why am I telling you about this? Because this is a great environmental justice project for our church, and more importantly, a great thing to do. We have many wonderful gardeners at Starr King, and it would be exciting to see the impact we could make. If you have extra fruit or produce, why not give them a call? They can come pick it for you, or you can deliver it to them. And if you do, let us know!

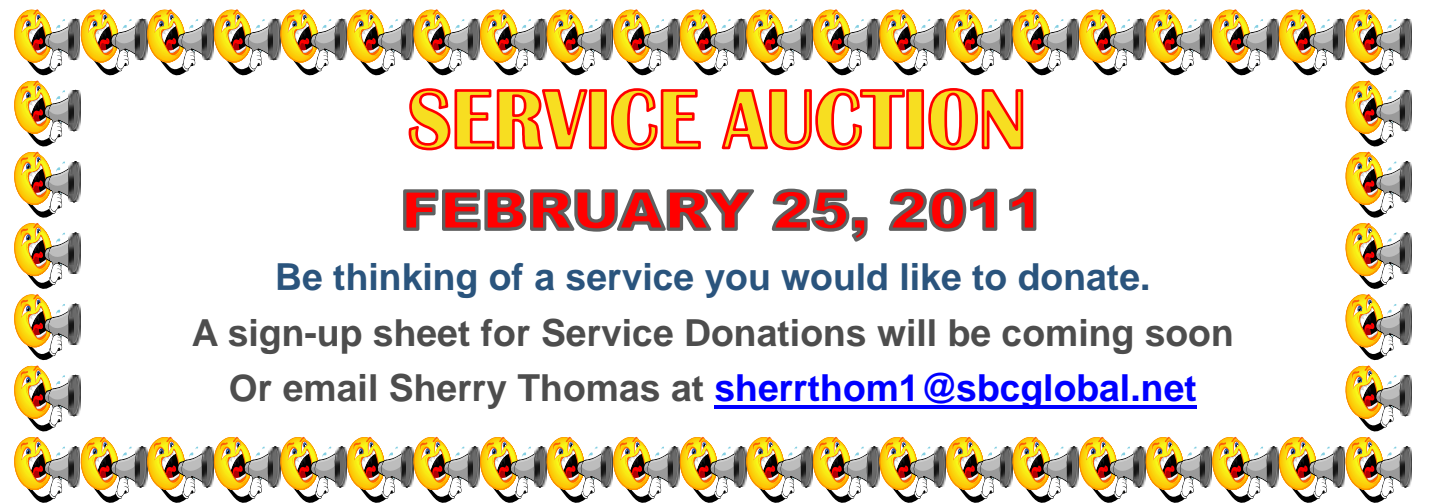

Drum Circle Circles Around Please Join Us

The drum circle to be held in our sanctuary on October 7, from 7 to 9 PM, will mark our half-year anniversary. Drumming has certainly become an ear- and brain-opening experience for me, and I want to make sure that everyone in the congregation knows that you are always welcome--even if you have never drummed before. Even if your parents/guardians/teachers/friends told you to stay away from music because you had a tin ear or couldn't carry a tune in a basket. They were WRONG! If you can perambulate and vocalize, as well as breathe and have a beating heart, you indeed have rhythm and will fit right in.

We are all beginners on this journey, and have no intention of leaving people out or behind. Yes, people get more comfortable with their instruments, and become more mindful of listening to others, experiencing group dynamics, and contributing in their own unique way the longer they attend, but even beginning beginners can step out onto the path and join in within seconds!

We do learn lessons along the way, but they are the kinds of life-lessons we need to be constantly reminded of anyway, and who knows, if a learning comes through one of your non-dominant intelligences, it may stick around for a while longer. Here are some examples of "lessons" I have learned on my path and have tried to pass on: Enjoy the journey. Don't worry. Keep it simple. You have a body--Play it (vocalize, move your feet, clap your hands, snap your fingers, hit your thigh). Never hurt yourself; breathe deeply, maintain the posture of a marionette suspended from the ceiling, relax into the rhythm, stop and adjust (change position or instrument) when you start to feel uncomfortable. Suspend all judgments, even (or especially) of yourself. Don't over think anything (try just doing, not thinking). Contribute what you can and what you feel. Mistakes don't exist, but different ways of accomplishing things do. Only good things happen when you let yourself go. Some of these lessons are from the universal "rules" of drum circle etiquette, but they seem to apply to lots of areas of life, too.

Drumming can be a part of your individual spiritual practice, as well as a group activity. Some of the rhythms we use in our circle can put an individual practitioner into a trance, but provide a wonderful background rhythm for others to improvise and play off of when performed in a group. All of the rhythms we use are "universal" rhythms--meaning that they are found in cultures all over the world, not just in one region.

I am continuing to explore other aspects of drumming. The "journeying" or shamanic circle I participate in last spring has disbanded, but I have discovered a "Drumming as Spiritual Practice" group in Berkeley that meets every other week, a really playful group that meets monthly also in Berkeley, and several other circles that meet on the peninsula or in San Francisco that I haven't had the time to explore. I am now commuting down to Santa Cruz weekly to play in a djembe ensemble class (we are learning culturally specific ways of playing, but new concepts are introduced at a glacial pace, so we will be ready for the next step when the preceding ones are completely embedded within us). In all the circles I am learning to listen and play with the group while following the leader as we change tempo, but in the Santa Cruz one we are learning exclusively by ear and by feel, because in Western culture we tend to rely way too much on vision, analysis, and effort, whereas in indigenous cultures the rhythms are passed on orally (aurally) and accompany movement in everyday life.

Please let me know if you would like to either join me in this exploration, or be informed of other drumming opportunities I hear of. And do please join us at our monthly circle right here at SKUUC. It's FUN, and we only PLAY music, not work at it!
