KATIE'S BAY VIEW

I love December with all of its full-blown complexity. Besides entering into a real change of seasons, December contains more than the usual share of holidays. These festivities honor varying religious traditions, all of them meaningful, valid and relevant to particular members of the community.

Hanukkah occurs sometime in December, moving around each calendar year.

This year it falls between December 20 and 28th. In Judaism Hanukkah is a minor holiday, but it's important to remember not only for its message of freedom and miracle making, but also as a corrective to the blinders that sometimes appear in the Christian and secular world that bring Christmas ubiquity and omnipresence. The winter solstice marks that inevitable turn of the star wheel at the darkest time of the year. It reminds us of the earth-centered traditions that find their way into other winter events. Advent and Christmas are holy days recognizing that birth, whether it be sacred or an ordinary miracle, is a recognition that life should go on, and recognized even in the "lowest" of places. The African-American celebration of Kwanzaa brings together history, culture and family in a weeklong awareness.

I'm a big fan of Advent and Christmas and I find that I sometimes wrestle with an attempt to put the rest of the holiday observances in a month already chock-full. And yet, I can't imagine loving Christmas like I do in a religious tradition that didn't hold some sort of place for the diversity of faith traditions. When my kids were little, we would always light the menorah and say a blessing for the day. I think I confused them at the time—for a number of years they thought we were Jewish. As adults, they have a more mature understanding that we placed value on respecting the wisdom from the world's traditions that inspire us in our ethical and spiritual life. My kids' dad celebrates his birthday on the 21st of December, and solstice traditions were inherent in that midwinter day.

This season is a reminder for me also of the great diversity of belief and expression of these holidays. I know there is a great chance that you will not be in sync with me and so I am challenged to keep an open mind for the way you do the holidays. Regardless of whether you do them up with visits from family, piles of generosity, or a simplicity of activity and spirit, let me wish you well. I wish you every kind of happiness at this time of year, and I pray for you to have everything that makes you more whole. Most of all, I wish you peace—deep, deep peace.

Greetings! I hope your holidays are feeling satisfying and manageable as you read this. It's axiomatic that holidays are "supposed to be" filled with family, friends and cheer, along with at least a few gifts given and received. "Supposed to be" can be such a tyrant!

I remember spending the winter holidays with my gathered family in Nebraska a decade or so ago. The details are beyond my recall, but I was having a *terrible* time and finding a lot of fault in my loved ones and my own life. I felt so *depressed* about it afterward. Going back for the next winter holiday, I worried that my current visit would recapitulate my angst of the prior one. Thankfully, I was inspired with a new approach to the holidays that I still employ: The "Good Enough Holidays." I realized I was setting the bar too high: I didn't actually need a *great* holiday or family visit; a "good enough" one would do.

What would I need for my "good enough holiday?" I tried to set modest yet meaningful criteria: I would like to go to one holiday party; give and get at least one gift; do one unselfish thing to improve someone else's holiday; sing Christmas Carols with someone; have at least one person I could check in with about how we each were *truly* experiencing the holidays. If I could have these things, I decided, my holiday would be "good enough" to merit honest satisfaction.

Devising my "good enough" list is only half the process, though. The other half is *planning how to reach my goals*. I have a lot of control over whether my list is achieved. (If I don't, then my list needs revision.) I can ask someone to exchange an inexpensive, thoughtful gift with me. I can be alert for party opportunities and, if necessary, ask to attend one. I can always find ways be of service to others. I can ask someone to be my Holiday Friend to check in with if things get hairy; I can even pre-plan certain times to check in, to avoid shyness about picking up the phone.

Should my "good enough" holiday plans fall short somehow, Plan B kicks in: make a gratitude list. I can *always* find blessings to appreciate, like having eyes to see and living in a country where bombs don't routinely explode. Simple, important blessings. That said, however, I've never failed to manage "good enough" holidays since I began planning them. This allows me to look back on them and feel contented, not short-changed.

That's good enough for me.

Religious Exploration

On December 4, 2011, Cynthia Breeden-Johnson the Literacy Plus Program Coordinator at Hayward Public Library will be visiting our Religious Exploration Program. She will bring us a marvelous gift. She will bring us information about children who would love to have books in their homes to read. She'll tell us their first name, their age, and something about their interests. Then the children and youth in our Religious Exploration program will prepare a "little library" for each child wishing books.

Each little library will include about 10 books especially chosen for each child. The books will be placed into a backpack and then the backpack will be personalized with the name of the child who will receive it. On December 10, 2010, about 40 "little libraries" will be delivered to the Literacy Plus Program for distribution during their holiday party.

There is plenty of work to be done before the libraries can be assembled. First, we will be collecting children's books that can be used in the project. If you have any children's books that you no longer need we welcome them for use in this project. Please place them in the box labeled "little libraries" in the hall at the church. Or we could also use your "helping hands. Over the next two weeks we'll need to separate about 40 boxes of books by age and interests and prepare the backpacks for filling. If you would like to help, please come join us on 11/20/11 or 11/27/11 from 11:45 pm to 1:45 pm or 12/4/11 from 10:45 am to 1:45 pm in the area where the pre-school and school-age religious exploration occurs.

These little libraries are powerful indeed. As Katherine Mansfield reminds us that "The pleasure of all reading is doubled when one lives with another who shares the same books."


ARE YOU TECH SAVVY? LIKE WORKING WITH YOUTH? PUT YOUR SKILLS TO GOOD USE!

GIFTS UNDER THE TREE OR A ROOF OVER THE HEAD?

The following is a portion of the FESCO's Executive Director's article in their newsletter:

"We believe the most important thing our supporters can do for homeless families this Christmas is to ensure that they have a safe, warm place to stay in a supportive environment so that next year, these families will have a home of their own.

The cost of a day at the Shelter for one person -- food, services, utilities, maintenance, and other direct costs -- is \$50. Given our average family size, one night's stay for a family costs \$160. If **FESCO supporters** donate in cash the same amount spent on gifts in previous years, families with nowhere to go at Christmas and throughout the year will continue to have a safe, welcoming environment to help them find their way home again.

There are other programs in our community that provide Christmas gifts for children. Local volunteer groups provide Christmas parties for the families at our shelter. If you were planning to participate in the Adopt a Family program this year, we ask that you consider adopting a family's shelter stay instead."

Starr King has always staunchly supported FESCO. The response to last year's "Move-In Kits" was phenomenal. We provided kits enough to last well beyond this Christmas! Let's listen again to the director's suggestion (plea?) and help in the manner known to be most beneficial.

How many days, for how many families can we provide? Enough to be proud of, surely.

A **FESCO** tree will be available for the donations.

UNITARIAN-UNIVERSALISTS AND THE "OCCUPY" MOVEMENT

Are you wondering how to relate to the Occupy Movement (Occupy Wall Street, et al)?

Is the Occupy Movement the Left's answer to the Tea Party?

Is the Occupy Movement the American Autumn following in the footsteps of the Arab Spring?

What are other thinking UUs saying about it?

There are striking parallels between the objectives which are beginning to form in the Occupy Movement with the objectives of dozens of mainstream progressive political organizations, including AFL/CIO, AFSCME, Code Pink, Faithful America, MoveOn.org , Planned Parenthood, People for the American Way, Progressive Democrats for America, and the Sierra Club. These organizations and dozens of others have composed a **Contract for the American Dream**, setting forth ten planks in a platform for congressional action, such as:

- End the Wars and Invest in America's Infrastructure
- Tax Wall Street Speculation
- Return to Fairer Tax Rates
- Invest in Public Education
- Offer Medicare for All
- Secure Social Security

While the Occupy Movement has been with us for a little over two months, many people still wonder about its lack of focus. The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee has tied the Occupy Movement into Unitarian Universalist principles in the following open letter.

Open Letter of Support for the Occupy Movement

"I stand with people around the country and the world who are calling for economic justice. "My values affirm that each person has inherent worth and dignity; that justice, equity, and compassion should be the guiding principles for human relationships; and that all people deserve access to the democratic process.

"My recognition of the inherent worth of every person compels me to speak out against policies that privilege the demands of corporations over the human rights of people. I support the Occupy movement in its affirmation that protecting workers' rights and ensuring that basic human needs are met must take precedence. All people have a fundamental right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of themselves and their families.

Open Letter of Support for the Occupy Movement (cont.)

"I also join the Occupy movement in decrying the wealth disparity that leaves millions struggling for economic security. Policies and legislation that promote economic marginalization are morally unacceptable. Everyone is entitled to a government that recognizes and promotes basic economic rights. Justice, equity, and compassion should be foremost in our government's decision making.

"Economic oppression is not only a violation of fundamental human rights, it is also a blow to democracy. When economic power is concentrated in the hands of a few and when corporations are awarded the same status as actual human beings, the democratic process is fundamentally compromised. Basic fairness requires that all people have equal opportunity to participate in political debate and to be represented in government.

"I envision a powerful and radically inclusive movement for economic justice. I recognize economic justice as a right that is due to all people, regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, language, religion, political or other opinion, immigration status, national or social origin, property, birth, or other status or distinction.

"I sign this letter as an expression of gratitude to all who are working for economic justice in the United States and around the world, as an affirmation of my hope for fair and compassionate economic reforms, and as a renewal of my commitment to help make it so."
