Greetings, and welcome to March. It's time to welcome the coming of spring in our hemisphere, and the Vernal Equinox on March 20th! March is a metaphorical Spring at Starr King Church, too. In springtime, one plants the seeds which, properly tended, will bring a rich and satisfying harvest. Just so, our *Canvass Kick-Off* commences on Sunday March 11th, when we will be making our pledges to Starr King UU Church for the coming year. Each of us will have the opportunity to look into our hearts and ask, "Am *I* planting seeds in the precious soil of our beloved community as generously as I should? Am I doing my part to support the mission and work of Starr King, to prepare our fields for new growth, not only to feed me and mine, but to feed my friends, my community and the many people I haven't met yet who will come to us in their search for meaning and a spiritual home?" The Lovers, The DREAMers and Me

I recently had the opportunity to hear 21 year-old Fermin Mendoza tell his story. Fermin was born in the Mexican border town of Tamaulipas and grew up in Houston, Texas after entering the United States with his family at the age of four on his parents' tourist visa. His parents chose to extend their stay and told him at a young age that he was not a U.S. citizen, and therefore, should not discuss his status because "he didn't have papers." He was undeterred by this fact, studied hard and was admitted to Stanford University where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in Public Policy in 2011. However, seventeen years since he entered this country, he finds himself in a difficult position because employers won't hire him as an undocumented immigrant.

Thousands of hard working youth, like Fermin, brought into the United States by their families as infants or young children are being incarcerated in federal detention centers and being deported to their country of origin that they barely know as a result of ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) raids. In July 2011, Governor Jerry Brown signed the California DREAM Act (Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors) into law that would stop such actions in California. The California DREAM Act allows law-abiding youth, brought into the U.S. before their 16th birthday by their families without proper documentation, to apply for student financial aid and matriculate into college. These undocumented youth must have already attended school regularly and must meet GPA and continuous residency requirements in order to qualify under this act. A recent effort to repeal the California DREAM Act failed to garner enough signatures last month to qualify for the November 2012 ballot.

In 1982, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in "Plyer v. Doe" that K-12 schools couldn't discriminate against students seeking enrollment based on immigration status. However, this ruling did not include enrollment into colleges. A federal DREAM act would enable a path to legalization for undocumented youth brought into this country as children, with good moral character (i.e. not convicted of violating any serious laws) if they agree to enroll in college or serve in the military for two years. A federal DREAM Act would offer a pathway to citizenship and an opportunity to attend college or serve in the military for undocumented youth, like Fermin. During this election year, some presidential candidates are promising to veto any such legislation while other elected officials are trying again to get this legislation passed. As the anniversary of Cesar Chavez's birthday approaches on March 31st, let his words serve as a reminder to our federal government that they must pass and sign the DREAM Act now: "¡Sí, se puede
