Usually, when we think of religious education (or exploration), we think of children. But we know that one of the draws of this Unitarian Universalist tradition is the love of learning. Our tapestry of faith, and the opportunity to engage in ongoing, adult learning, nurtures Unitarian Universalist identity, spiritual growth, a transforming faith, and vital communities of justice and love.

Your schedules are full. So we'll do our best to offer fewer sessions so that you don't have to commit to something long term—unless you want to. As always, we have wonderful ongoing groups at church like Morning Discovery, Evening Meditation, the book group, SKIT (Starr King Improv Theatre), and the Elderberries. President's Message

November greetings! It's going to be a full month! Keep your eyes out for news of the Welcoming Congregation Refresher Program, which will examine how we are doing with "inclusive language." And November kicks off with *Dia de los Muertos*, the Day of the Dead, giving us the opportunity to remember and appreciate those who have transcended the Great Mystery before us. Celebrating *Dia de los Muertos* is a warm tradition at Starr King and the altar created for it is always affecting.

Dia de los Muertos is a tender and loving reverie, but an aura of spookiness hangs about it; those we love who have died may have a continued existence in an unseen Other World. Conjecture about the nature of that Other World is no casual inquiry!

Some of us think that life ends when life *as we know it* ends. I lean toward this myself. But it confounds me to think I end with death, since I have never known an existence in which "I" was not a central feature. On the other hand, I confess to a tiny suspicion that when my eyes close in death, that just might be *the end of you too*. In our largely Judeo-Christian tradition, the specter of damnation clings to death even for those who "don't believe," and folklore tells us that those who step too near the Other World may sometimes be plucked unexpectedly into it, on a one-way ticket.

I don't know what the "truth" is about another plane of existence but I find it arresting that we in our culture conflate our beloved decedents with a sphere which has distinctly threatening vibes. Like mythic images of Devouring Mother or Murderous Child, we sense with unease that what is most dear to us can be transformed into our destruction. Like the barrier between the quick and the dead which is said to become permeable on November 1st, we harbor a special fascination for things which are at once marvelous and perilous.

At the end of November we celebrate Thanksgiving, to acknowledge with thanks the gifts life has bestowed upon us. We celebrate our continued existence with a bounty of food, because all bounty echoes absent privation. Our gratitude is informed by awareness that the gifts of this world are not bestowed equally; we set aside this special day to notice and be humbled by our good fortunes and invite others to draw near our cozy hearths. November, you are all about shifting boundaries, whether of existence or circumstance.



November brings the Leonid meteor showers in mid-month, peaking around the 17th. The Leonids are often easily seen at this time of year. They were so vivid in 1833 that many, many people thought The End was at hand; the illustration at left depicts that event. If you find yourself away from the city lights on a clear night, why not grab a blanket, a friend and a Thermos of some hot tasty drink, and revel in our extravagant cosmos?

Gratitude and Grace

Gratitude and grace. Two words with a common root. Both concepts signify the free exchange of kindness or thanks or blessing and in this month of November, the month of Thanksgiving, we turn our spirit to the joy we feel in the presence of grace with an intention of gratefulness or gratitude. When I think of our Californian lifestyle replete with ambition, deal making, and entrepreneurship, I sense that the moments for gratitude are few and awkwardly intersperse between goal directed activities. But we should make room for grace, for those unbidden times when beauty, love, or compassion roars into our anxious souls.

Hindu philosophy talks about the contrast between a “monkey god” and a “cat god”. A cat god, like a mother cat, carries her kittens by the scruff of their necks, while a monkey god requires her offspring to cling to her back as she cavorts among the trees. To me, the Divine is both like a monkey and a cat; like kittens, we can experience grace from universe, from the world, from our communities and friends as though we were lifted up without effort or demand from us. On the other hand, like monkeys, our actively giving thanks or offering gratitude is a reaching out to the Divine or our common humanity, so that we might acknowledge our relationship to others beyond ourselves and so that we would covenant to reciprocate that unsought for grace that we have blessed with.

So gratitude and grace, monkey and cat, Thanksgiving and receiving gifts, all come together during this month of November, lying right between harvest and winter.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Moral GPS -

This is what a teacher graciously pointed out to me after leading children that day.

The lesson was centered on this idea of a "Moral Compass." What I did not think about was this: is a compass something our children will understand or ever actually use, whether they are 4 or 9 years old? Moral compass, what an antiquated notion. The lesson really should have been "Moral GPS."

"Education at its best—this profound human transaction called teaching and learning—is not just about getting information or getting a job. Education is about healing and wholeness. It is about empowerment, liberation, transcendence, about renewing the vitality of life. It is about finding and claiming ourselves and our place in the world." --Parker Palmer, from *To Know As We Are Known: Education as a Spiritual Journey*

If we are going to teach our children to claim their place in the world, we do need to instill in them a moral navigation system, whether it's a compass or a GPS. And this question of 'instilling', of how we communicate meaningful lessons to children, was the topic of discussion during a Saturday morning meeting with the RE teachers for this year. We engaged in rich discussion over this quote from Parker Palmer. One teacher commented "You know, we are going to make mistakes and that's okay. We can model how to make a mistake. We can model imperfection." In other words, we can model being human in humane ways. That's how we teach.

I think if there is something I can promise this congregation, it is this: I will model imperfect humanity, over and over again. It is easy to get caught up in the details. I will probably pick another outdated learning prop in the near future. But whether we are navigating using a compass, a GPS, or the stars, I believe we are on similar journeys and looking for some good company to help us along the way; to help our children find their ways. For me, that is what church is about: good (and imperfect) company. Church is about focusing on relationships, not just the details. Because when our child's GPS' battery dies, she is going to be real glad somebody in the congregation brought along that compass.



WHY SHOULD I CARE ABOUT GAY RIGHTS?

I think the first response to that is to question the very idea of “gay” rights. I think the proper context is “civil” rights. And therein lies my answer to the question. I grew up in a largely ethnic area, where my religion was in the minority. I was not just a Jew, I was, (depending on the protagonist of the moment, a “dirty jew,” a “cheap jew,” a “Christ Killer,” a “commie jew,” and a few other hopefully forgotten terms. I had a grammar school principal of German origin who had lost a son in the war, “fighting for YOU people.”

In the 1960’s I became one of millions of marchers to secure civil rights for African Americans. My own Mother could not understand this....”You’re not a N---r, let them fight for themselves...it’s not your fight.”

But it WAS my fight. I don’t know if it was my own background of being on the receiving end of bigotry.....I’d like to think I had come to this simply because it’s right...but we are all creatures of our own experiences.

I was probably typical in that while I was aware of gay people, (only we didn’t use the term ‘gay.’ There were other non-nuanced terms, most insulting and crude,) it was only in the past twenty years or so that they were more than just a blip on my radar. I began to find that some of my co workers and friends were ‘not the same.’ And in sharing friendships, I began to understand and empathize with some of the daily struggles and insults these people were undergoing....and there is nothing heroic or self sacrificing in my conclusion that the LGBTQ communities deserve every degree of freedom that I enjoy....that racial minorities deserve....that EVERYONE deserves. To live and love in peace. These are not “special rights.”

These are civil rights....rights for humans, whomever they may be. For me there can only be one stance on the subject. And if I cannot understand that these struggles are simply a matter of right and wrong, and if I don’t do what I’m able to right those wrongs, then I myself do not deserve those rights. I guess it’s too complex for many....for me it’s just the right thing to do...not heroic, not even noble....just the right thing to do. The selfish truth is that I must live with myself, and bigotry of any kind is not compatible with that.
