I've always been a fan of Christmas, the many secular bits as well as the more religious parts. In my house, we've not only got the originally Victorian inspired Christmas tree with its roots in American Unitarian history, but a menorah lit for Hanukkah, and more than one cultural style of nativity crèche.

Traditional holidays with their ancient roots are bound to have morphed and reformed over the years, and it seems that Christmas is the king of this practice. Each person I talk with has her own belief system about its importance or relevance, each person has his own practices, each family has their own ways of finding comfort and meaning in the holiday, including ignoring it altogether.

In recent years I have looked for new ways to find my own December meanings, instilling more time for spiritual practice rather than consumer to-do lists, making sure I send gentle thoughts and prayers honoring family rather than particular expectations. For I know I am not alone in noting the differences and various experiences of grief that have come upon us over the years. Creating and honoring holiday traditions is a value to me, yet I'm careful not to let expectations of what "should" be get in the way. Illness and emergencies are just as apt to happen in December as they are any other time of year—I better make room to be able to drop something!

Regardless of what happens this year, I will appreciate Christmas. Not for the new outlet mall, or the holiday foodstuffs, nor for the possibility of that special gift, but for the places where I still may find the discovery in something merry and good. And that might be in the warmth of nature brought indoors, of any tradition honored or renewed, of lights kindled, of love expressed.

May you find avenues for your joy: in religious practice, in spiritual or secular activity, in the bounty of human comfort or in a small piece of silence. May you have everything merry and good.

Hello, Starr King family. Did you find a state of mind that kept "thanks" firmly embedded in Thanksgiving? It's perhaps my favorite holiday and its glow of well-being generally lingers; rat-a-tat-tatting out a list of my gratitudes is always good practice. One of my foremost gratitudes is belonging to this spiritual community. You give me social warmth, focused worship, useful work and an opportunity to explore, discuss and learn from your moral compasses as I fine -tune my own.

December 1st is World AIDS Day, now in its 26th year of observance. More than 25 million humans have died from HIV in that span. Despite oceans of public health information and dynamic prevention/treatment innovations, there is still great ignorance, fear, stigma and mortality associated with HIV, abroad and at home. Consider talking to someone this month about your or their connection to this epidemic, and why you care.



The Board of Trustees (BOT) and Committee on Ministry (COM) are already at work planning their annual joint retreat, which will be on Saturday February 2nd. We retreat together annually, with our Parish Minister, to strengthen the bonds of shared ministry and stewardship between BOT and COM, learn from our respective wisdom (and error, sometimes), and plan for the year ahead. If you have thematic, ministerial (in the shared sense) or stewardship concerns, this is a great time to share them with me or BOT Vice-President Colleen Dino, COM Chair Bob Britton, Rev. Katie or anyone else on the BOT/COM so that they can be considered for our retreat agenda.

Are you fulfilling your potential as a leader at Starr King? Where might you add your talents and interests for our common benefit? Starr King has enjoyed initiatives this year from the Finance Committee and Committee On Ministry to educate us about what they do, do for us, and how *your* collective input and guidance is translated into pastoral, organizational and fiduciary management. The Board of Trustees is going to continue this trend with an after-church presentation in January 2013, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee. All these leadership bodies *stand in your shoes* as a congregation and *do your work* in helping Starr King to be a growing and stable enterprise. Starr King relies on steady waves of leadership development to identify and engage the people whose creativity, wisdom and energy will carry us into the future. I hope you'll take the time this January to attend the BOT presentation following Sunday worship and think seriously about ratcheting up *your* involvement as a Starr King leader.

I had good fortune to spend a few days in Chicago just before Thanksgiving. Chicago is one of these fabulous "in between" cities, partaking of the East and the West Coasts. The weather was balmy and the people were amiable. I was attending and presenting at a Near Eastern archaeology conference; the attendees were from all over the world and discussed latest findings about the archaeology of Israel, Jordan, Cyprus and Syria.

What most surprised me was how rapidly, in the last half-decade or so, the archaeology of the "Biblical Lands" has shifted from concerns over kings, wars and biblical texts to commoners and peasants and goddesses. It was almost like the Occupy Movement—less concern over Saul and David—more interest in the resilience of the Judean farmers who intermixed with other peoples and persisted through wars, exiles, and famines. My talk was on the origin of the Philistines—you know, the Goliath people who settled along the coast of Palestine—and how their DNA is still recognizable in the DNA of modern people living in Israel. The Philistines likely came from the Greek islands or the Turkish coast and set up shop in towns such as Gaza, Ashkelon, Ashdod—cities we hear about today in the awful clamor of conflict between Gaza and Israel.

Yet optimism infused the conference. There was much talk of globalization and interconnectivity in the ancient world and adaptation to climate change and geological catastrophes. The biblical world was a realm both different from and similar to ours. Only through a progressive shift into more global and interrelated attitude of compassion did the people of the Bible survive. That is, in my view, the lesson for us today.

The darkness of December if upon us! Both stifling and cozy at the same time, there is something quite meaningful for me about these darkest days of the year. It makes an intuitive kind of sense that we would fill our schedules with family

gatherings and big meals; that we would light candles, string lights across our doorways and windows, and decorate trees. It even makes sense to me that Christians would celebrate the birth of their savior-- out of darkness, we can emerge transformed. In the darkness, we need to hunker down with those we love and honor the depths of our connection to each other, to our inner most selves, and to the light which would not exist without the dark.

Of course, getting in touch with what we could call the spirituality of the season is difficult after hearing the 100th rendition of Jingle Bells (FYI: written by a UU minister) while standing in a long line for that gift which happens to be on sale and would be perfect for your child, mother, or brother. STARR KING WELCOMES WAYNE BENNION



Wayne Bennion was born in Santa Cruz, California, in 1954, but grew up in Hanford and Fresno. After a three-year stint in the Army, spent mostly in Germany, he took a job at Pacific Telephone in 1976, which took him to San Luis Obispo, San Francisco and San Ramon. Wayne has lived in Castro Valley since 1989. He received a Bachelor's degree in Computer Science from CSU Hayward in 1988, only (!) 17 years after graduating high school.

Wayne has ancestors who immigrated to Utah in the first year of the Mormon settlement there. He was raised in the LDS church and excommunicated from it at his request early in his adult life. Brief involvements with various congregations of the Metropolitan Community Church failed to make him a Christian.

In "The Importance of Being Earnest" by Oscar Wilde, Lady Bracknell says: "To lose one parent may be regarded as a misfortune. To lose both looks like carelessness." Wayne relates this to his life partners. He lost one to AIDS in 1992, and another to cancer in 2010. He has found comfort and healing here at Starr King since shortly after the second loss.

Wayne retired from the telephone company in 1998, expecting to have a short retirement before being carried off by HIV. He is constantly amazed, but grateful, to remain among the living.

WHY I SUPPORT GAY RIGHTS⁸

When I was asked to write this article I thought it would be a fairly simple task. After all, why wouldn't I support Gay Rights? What makes it difficult is that it actually brings up a bit of a "pet peeve" of mine. I do not like to put people into "groups". I try to live in a way in which I support <u>ALL</u> peoples rights, to "group" them is to do everyone an injustice. To me rights don't come in groups, rights come as individuals.

We humans group people by the labels we give them. This makes it easier to discriminate and take away the inherent rights we ALL deserve. While some group identities are encouraged by the groups themselves, all too often these identities only encourage inequality. When people are treated as individuals it is much more difficult to eliminate their rights as human beings.

I guess it was this conviction which made it so natural to support our son when he "came out". To John and me it was a non-issue. Loy is a wonderful, caring, intelligent person and he and his partner (Larry) live a very normal life as two committed individuals. It is only when they are labeled as "gay" and viewed as part of a group, that I see the discrimination they must endure. I have seen Loy discriminated against at other times too. As a member of the "Asian group" he has often suffered from the hate encouraged by this requisite grouping

Where is it written that it is okay to treat someone in a disrespectful, hurtful way, because of who they love or because of the color of their skin or the shape of their eyes. This is why it is hard to say why I support gay rights, I support everyone's' rights.

I have always had what some might consider a simplistic view, but I believe that people are people and deserve a life of equality. I am just idealistic and optimistic enough to believe that a time will come when, to paraphrase Dr. Martin Luther King, all people will not be judged by the group they represent, but by the content of their character.

I can't say how or when I came to this life-long conviction, but it has been part of me for longer than I can remember. I grew up in an upper middle class, all white neighborhood in Oakland. While my family were politically conservative, we were taught to have a great deal of pride in what I might call the "Traditional American Values" of equality and fairness. We were brought up to believe that the US was truly a "melting pot" in which people of every nationality and ethnic group had the same chance to succeed. After all, we had just fought a World War to save these values from those who would remove them from the world.

In reality it might not have been true, but we were so immersed in these values, that as young people we believed they existed and as adults many of us have been fighting to make them truly exist for a very long time.

As an elementary teacher I resisted the labeling and grouping inherent in the education community. (How do you teach non-discrimination while you subtly demonstrate discrimination through your policies?) All of this seemed wrong at the time and still does.


I truly believe that if we could stop putting people into groups and encourage looking at each other as individuals, we could make a major dent in this most damaging human activity of discrimination..

I want to see a world in which no one is singled out, discriminated against, or bullied because they belong to one "group" or another. Where each individual is shown the respect they deserve and where **"The inherent worth and dignity of every person"** is a principle by which we all live.


