
Jan. 27 Universalism: A Theology for our Times -Roy King, Jr.

Musings on Stigmas and Sin

It's hard to imagine times more in need of love. We were rent apart as individuals, communities and a nation by the horrific shootings in Newtown. I see from a CNN post the words of Rep. Tim Scott of South Carolina; the appointee to replace Sen. Jim DeMint, who hinted that he may oppose any gun control legislation in the Senate, declaring that the greater issue is one of "moral decay." He also apparently followed with the statement that "mental illness should be a major part of the conversation."

Wow, as a committed UU and of a Universalist theological bent, it occurred to me that "moral decay" and "mental illness" have supplanted the notion of "original sin" from Christian theology. The early Universalists and many Unitarians in America were courageously and vociferously opposed to the idea of original sin--namely, that all humans have inherited Adam's moral flaw. Many felt that God was too good to pre-condemn human beings. What if moral decay and mental illness, both of which are attributed to certain individuals in our society, serve as the new original sin? We tend to view these days many psychological conditions, such as Asperger's Syndrome or psychosis, as inherited or biological flaws. Like Tim Scott, many of us would ascribe to the horrific to the marginal acts of "deranged" individuals, ignoring the systemic flaws in our society.

I believe that the social isolation, competitiveness and lack of communal bonding that are rampant in America are the structural sins that feed chaos, despair and confusion, rather than differences in moral beliefs or susceptibility to psychological illness.

If so, then Universalism with its fundamental values of loving, respecting and dignifying all could be the antidote to fragmentation, could be a balm that soothes the rage and violence so prevalent in our culture today. A salvation of all through loving-kindness, instead of marginalization of a few through labeling.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

The teachers were working with the children on Solstice and why we had so much darkness this time of year. "Some animals deal with the darkness by hibernating." So of course when it came to work on the Advent calendar (again!), one of the children said "I'm hibernating! I can't do it."

As parents, many of you know that one has to pick your battles. And a key part for me of a UU religious education is supporting children's independence and creativity AND their respect and consideration for their community.

"Okay, you want to hibernate? You can hibernate, but you REALLY need to hibernate. Hibernation means sleeping, resting, and being quiet." I led the child over the couch and placed a pillow on him-- "Okay, here is your hibernation den. You can stay over here as long as you are hibernating."

"I want to hibernate too!" said another child. I repeated the rules, gave them a pillow, and went back to the table where the rest of the children were working on their Advent calendar tiles.

Why is it if I asked them to be quiet and still, they would barely last 15 seconds? But letting them hibernate and opt out of the main activity? Those children were quiet on that couch "hibernating" for a good 20 minutes.

For me, participating in religious community, doing (or trying to) regular spiritual practices is about growing in wisdom about navigating these push/pull situations. What battles do I choose? When do I just go with the flow?

In the New Year, Natasha Arakawa and I will be starting a monthly gathering of parents to explore questions like these, support one another in our spiritual journeys, and figure out how to talk with our children about difficult topics like God and evil. I look forward to sharing more time together with many of you addressing these important issues.



STARR KING WELCOMES Not So New Member⁷ HEIDI BRUINS GREEN



One of my first memories of growing up Unitarian is standing in the stairwell of our church, craning my neck to look up at the enormous painting of Mary that Sam, one of our more colorful members, had painted on that huge white space. The sheer overwhelmingness of that gorgeous lady left no doubt in me that Mary had indeed been the 20-foot tall black lesbian depicted. Though, now that I think of it, maybe that was actually meant to be Jesus. I was born and raised a Unitarian, but I'm not a lifelong UU. Like many raised in our eclectic community, I've shopped around. Growing up a UU, I became well acquainted with a number of other religions and their beliefs and practices, but I had no idea what being a Unitarian meant. We never studied that. Perhaps we were too self-conscious about proselytizing to teach our own kids about Unitarianism.

I was born in Sacramento and raised in Bakersfield, so my roots are in the Central Valley. But the Bay Area is the first place I've lived that has felt like HOME to me. I left Bakersfield in 1975 to get a Bachelors degree in Women's Studies at UC Santa Cruz. Ten years later I got an M.B.A. at UC Davis. I left Bakersfield engaged to my high school sweetheart, a young man a year older than I. By the time I had my M.B.A., I was living with the woman who would later become my wife.

My entire life, I have been an activist. My mom used to say my first civil rights march was in the womb. My parents were very active in civil rights in Bakersfield. My dad worked closely with Cesar Chavez. My mom taught me to be a strong, proud woman. No one can fight for everything without burning out. I've found I have to pick my battles or get burned out. For me, the issues that pull at my soul are interrupting racism and LGBT issues in the workplace. I am hugely grateful to people who take on other, equally important work to make our world a better place.

Even before getting my M.B.A., I was an accountant. With the M.B.A., I ascended to the ranks of corporate management at Procter & Gamble, was promoted several times, and relocated to Cincinnati Ohio for 12 years, mecca to Proctoids. Cincinnati is a racist and homophobic city. I learned how to be a better leader at work, and how to be a better activist the rest of the time.

My work evolved into more creative endeavors while in Cincinnati. I moved out of accounting and finance, and into learning and development. I'm now a contract instructional designer, focusing on designing and developing eLearning or online training programs. It is like being able to do crafts all day. I love it!

I've lived in the Bay Area for nine years now. James and I married in October of 2003. His daughter Morgan lives with us. She's 27 and got her M.S.W. in May. She is smart, ironic, and amazing. Her brother Nick has lived with us at different times. He's 23, and just got a job at FedEx Office, is starting junior college in January, and, is moving to the East Bay early next year. He had some struggles, but is getting on his feet, and I suspect will do amazing things with his life. The four of us have developed a strong, loving family unit. I have my fingers crossed that, while I never had kids of my own, I may one day have grandkids!

My activism continues: the Anti-Racist Multi-Cultural Alliance and helping with the Welcoming Congregation refresher at SKUUC, as well as conducting research on the experience of bisexuals in the workplace and building a national bisexual organization. I can imagine both my parents watching me sometimes, and saying "that's our girl!"
