I'm sure that by the time you're reading this we'll be long past the Thirty Days of Love that has been promoted throughout email and social media, and acted out in sanctuaries and on streets across the country. But in this moment, I am overcome with the continued message of this campaign, and how it's been actively lived out among us in recent days. This is what has been on my mind and heart: our reciprocal visits with Congregation Shir Ami brought opportunities for deepening understanding and connection with our neighbors. It re-awakened acquaintances and made friendships more connected. It taught me more about the lived qualities of Reform Judaism, and reminded me about what is important about Unitarian Universalism. It made me feel pride that our folks came out in such great numbers on a dark and rainy Friday night, and that we welcomed our visitors on Sunday with such a lovely, visible and delicious hospitality.

During this same weekend, when we were stretching ourselves to articulate our faith and learn about our liberal religious neighbors, I was also paying attention to the Moral March on Raleigh, North Carolina, an event where thousands of citizens gathered to cry out for change. Hundreds and hundreds of Unitarian Universalists joined in with people from the United Church of Christ, and others as they took to the streets to protest the many sad pieces of legislation being passed in the conservatively held state government. Changes include cuts in Medicaid and unemployment benefits, cuts for pre-K kids, slashing taxes on the upper 5 percent, passing anti-choice laws, and voter suppression.

Rev. Peter Morales tells us, "We must, as communities dedicated to justice, peace and love, reach out to others to share the transformational stories of what our unique faiths have to offer."

As I read the latest news from Standing on the Side of Love, the website named today's action. It said that our work today was to learn about the social justice work of another faith, and to "journal about what about that work inspires you." I'd like to ask you to do that work as well. When you journal about the social justice work we do here in our progressive corner of the world, maybe you might ask where can we work together to create change on the "arc of justice" and do it while building new relationships. Might we then find transformation in ourselves?

It was agreed that this goal includes increasing the visibility of the church in the community and increasing community knowledge of UU principles and practices.


Each goal is set up with a small team to report back the group in the next months. I am thankful for those who gave up part of their weekend to do this important work.

MARCH RE THEME: Spirit of Life

As my neighbor and avid gardener reminded me recently, March is the time in the Bay Area for planting our gardens. But you know what? With religious education and family ministry, we are ALWAYS planting and tending! We have just finished a big project with raising up the new playground. Where else and to what else do we need to tend in order to sprout and grow? In the Winter issue of the UU World, Rev. Tom Schade reminds us that religious communities exist not only to gather a community of like-minded folks together for mutual support. For Schade, we exist "to develop people who would care about an issue and feel the strength to act...to cultivate people who can feel passion."

A congregant recently told me she has started to regularly swing at sunset on our new playground. I responded with a hearty laugh and said "well, I could do some real theological reflection on that!" She looked at me and said "So, theologically reflect." My theological reflection was not anything I have not said before, particularly regarding the playground. I said that it had to do with the Gospel of Matthew, where Jesus says "Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven."

The ironic thing about "growing" people is that it's actually not about planting at all. We do not put anything inside anyone. Religious Liberals have long believed that spiritual development is actually about peeling back the layers of socialization to get to a more basic, child-like quality of wonder, passion, and awe. Our job is not to plant, but to be fertile and safe soil so that whoever chooses us as their religious home finds a place safe enough to grow into their most authentic, passionate selves.


Build the Common Good

News from the Hospitality & Membership Committee

We want to thank everyone for a wonderful time hosting our friends from Congregation Shir Ami. It goes without saying that our committee, by ourselves, could not create an inviting, welcoming and hospitable environment; but what a joy it is to work to strengthen and deepen our hospitality with the enthusiastic participation of so many. It was fun!

If you had the chance to talk with any of us wearing the funny hats during coffee hour, then you know the Hospitality & Membership (H&M) Committee has four initiatives that we are working on.

Gift Bags - We have currently begun to provide Gift Bags to visitors in exchange for their completion of a Visitor Information Card. One gift bag is provided for each card and includes an SKUU Coffee Mug, an individual portion of dry soup mix with instructions, and a variety of UU brochures for their consideration.

Coffee Mug Campaign - We have been using a supply of mugs donated by the previous Chairperson. Now we need more and, it turns out, so does the kitchen. So, we are asking members for contributions of \$10, with which we will buy 2 mugs (with our new logo) – 1 for the H&M Committee; and 1 that the member can choose to donate to the kitchen or take home. Our goal is to get 72 pairs of mugs and the sign-up sheet is on the community table.

Ready-to-Go Postcards - We are developing postcards that will be 'ready-to-go', so anyone in the congregation that meets & connects with a visitor can immediately write them a personal note or reminder. We are working out exactly how the postcards get addressed and posted.
