Our current Valentine's Day seems to be descended from ancient mating practices and medieval traditions of courtly love, although its exact origins are obscure. February 14 was originally a saint's day, named after two Christian saints with the same name, both martyred on February 14 in different years in the Third Century. We hear little about these two saints on February 14th nowadays. In England, the United States, and other countries, Valentine's Day has come to be more a day for lovers than a saint's day.

Psychologist Erich Fromm once said "love is the active concern for the life and growth of that which we love." He believed that love is a decision and a disciplined practice, not a passive feeling.

May we celebrate love this Valentine's Day and beyond with joy, whenever and wherever and it occurs: between lovers, between parents and children, among dear friends, and that expansive love that motivates us to work for justice, equality and a sense of connectedness with all people and the earth's creatures.
