Get Ready, Get Set.....

October and November have been busy times for your Search Committee! We have been finalizing the Congregational Record (CR) that is the first peek that ministers seeking a congregation get of us and who we are. The process has been more arduous than we imagined, but Natalie and Karen have managed it ably, with the support and guidance of the entire Search Committee.

The same is true of the Packet, which is actually a website we are putting together, that we will share with prospective ministers who look good to us. There are many people, Search Committee members and our loyal band of Search Boosters alike, creating a beautiful mosaic that is designed to attract and entice prospective ministers to us, like bees to honey.

The CR was turned in the end of October, and the packet will be turned in the end of November. We have spent quite a bit of time updating and improving the CR in November, and likely December will see that for the packet. The goal is to be done well before the end of December, because 2016 is when things really get busy! (And we thought we were busy before!)

To help you understand how we will use these two documents, and, in fact, how the rest of the search is going to work, let me lay out the process alongside the 2016 calendar:

First week of January—Ministers who are in search will have an opportunity to begin reviewing the Congregational Records all the congregations who are in search have created.

Mid-January—Ministers who are interested in Starr King will send us a link to their Ministerial Record (MR). Think of this as the wink someone gives you who wants to get to know you better.

Mid- to late-January—Search Committee will review those MRs in detail. All of us will review all of them in detail.

Late January—For those ministers we feel might be a good fit, we will send them a link to our packet to get to know us a little better. This is us winking back, sauntering over to them, and saying "How about we go get coffee and talk?"

February to first week of March—We will ask up to four "pre-candidates" to meet the Search Committee for meals, conversation, and to give a sermon in a neutral pulpit so we can see their style. This is the "ask them to go away for the weekend" stage of relationship building. Literally, since we will spend the weekend with each one.

April 7th—This is the day that we will extend an invitation to OUR candidate—the one you will meet and vote on—to join the dance with us. You can imagine how busy we will be leading up to this. Once our choice accepts us, we'll arrange a candidating week for them here, so you can meet them, hear them two successive Sundays, and vote—hopefully in 100% agreement—to call them as our next minister.

To recap, here's what we'll be doing:

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JANUARY—checking references, selecting potentials, striving for consensus

FEBRUARY—every weekend meeting with candidates, continuing reference checks during the weeks

MARCH—going over and over the files and information, everyone reading everything, going back to our research about who we are as a congregation, more consensus, finding that ONE RIGHT PERSON

Many thanks to all of you for putting your trust in us and supporting us. We anticipate stunning success!!

VI've heard that Sunday is the most segregated day of the week. N The monochromatic view around Starr King is actually the rule 🔌 across all types of denominations, from evangelical to liberal. 📎 This despite our oft-stated frustration with the situation at Starr 🔨 King. But church on Sunday mornings is not the only place where segregation is common. School cafeterias are another problem area, as the title of the Starr King 2015-16 common read indicates:

Why Are All the Black Kids Sitting Together in the Cafeteria? by Beverly Daniel Tatum, Phd.

The book is actually about a variety of conversations on race, not just about school kids. It's also about more than black and white. It's about the mosaic of race, and understanding our identities within that. The book is well researched, with many \checkmark citations; but Tatum is a storyteller, and that is how she compel-🔪 lingly navigates the sensitive topics she explores.

The culprit is racism—which she defines as a **system of advantage** based on There is 'internalized oppression' which people of color play into There is 'internalized oppression which peer that maintains racist systems, and, on the flip side, ignorance of how those systems oppress people of color that white people play into, thereby maintaining racist systems.

The book is an interesting and thought-provoking read. We will be discussing it in February, using the discussion guide at the back of the book, as well as coming up with our own questions. 📏 It's a fun and safe opportunity to participate in each other's % growth as we make room for everyone who might want to share 🔨 our sanctuary.

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
