# Words of Joy

Near the beginning of April, the hard-working Ministerial Search Committee will ask one of the "precandidates" they have been interviewing to be the candidate for the settled ministry of this congregation And then, in May, comes the moment you have been waiting for—the presentation of the ministerial candidate during what we call "candidating week," which is a very intensive week in the life of a congregation and of a ministerial candidate. The minister will speak on two consecutive Sundays, and be available during the intervening week to meet with groups, committees and in various social functions. Following the second service that the candidate presents, a congregational meeting will convene to discuss and vote on whether or not to call the candidate as your settled minister.

This process of calling a minister is a vital and participatory one in the life of a UU congregation. Unlike some other religious traditions, Unitarian Universalism operates through congregational polity. Only the congregation has the power to call and to ordain ministers. Ministers are not ordained by or appointed to congregations via the authority of a denominational body. The *congregation* is the authorized body. So it is especially important for all voting members to participate in this process—to listen to and meet the candidate, to be part of the discussion at the congregational meeting, and to vote. This is a very exciting time in the life of a UU congregation!

Spring is a time for new beginnings, and this spring in particular, a new era is dawning at Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church. May this season, bringing the freshness of new blooms after a rainy winter, also bring freshness and renewal to Starr King Church, and to the ongoing journey that is your life!



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### Common Read—Book Discussion

Join us immediately following the service on April 17 for a discussion of the book *Why Are All the Black Kids Sitting Together in the Cafeteria?* A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time—a means of building community by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations.



Just when I thought we were as busy as we could possibly be, the 2016.2017 canvass began! Stephanie Smith and Diane Meyerson had been working and planning behind the scenes. On March 12, they hosted a delicious meal for about 60 people--the kick-off of our Canvass Campaign. Chris Appleton was the chef, and the fare was terrific. During the meal (between courses) we sang fractured songs – old classics with new words about pledging.

Rev. Joy was our emcee and she joked, lead our singing, and generally kept things moving along and kept us entertained.

Sunday morning our canvassers got what they needed to contact every member in person to talk about our budget and how we fund it. We asked our supporters to consider an increase of 10 or 15 percent of their current pledge to fund our proposed budget. If everyone were able to raise their pledge by 15% we could add a Choir Director to our staff. Many members have mentioned that they would like to have a larger choir and this is the way to move in that direction. It would help a great deal if everyone would try to meet with your canvasser in person.

Our Committee Chairs are beginning to provide their annual reports for our Annual Congregational meeting on Sunday, May 1, 2016 right after the service. The last day to turn in reports is April 5, 2016. We have to mail the meeting notice with the agenda and the reports by April 21, 2016 as required in our bylaws. Kelli will be working on this and still will need time for her regular duties, so please get your reports in on time.

Many of us are preparing for the annual Ashland trip to see plays. Usually only one is from Shakespeare and there are two other offerings. It is a lot of fun to share this experience with friends. I will tell you more in May.

# **RE Reflections**

### **Create Rituals that Foster Connection**

In March, my daughter and I attended game night at Starr King. I cannot remember the last time I laughed so heartily. I forgot how good it felt! Playing games allows us to step outside of ourselves for a while, and forget our worries. It allows us to see the childlike side of adults that they seldom show to others. It is a great way to build community.

Consequently, my family decided to hold a weekly game night to foster better communication and connection between us. We found that our habit of watching TV together in the evenings didn't foster the kind of interaction we'd like. So, one night a week we will be forced to work together, and to talk to each other, rather than retreating into our own little worlds.



I encourage you to do something that will keep the communication flowing in your family. If not game night, then regular discussions during dinner are a good option. For example, each family member can share one good thing and one bad thing that happened to them that day. Or, you can ask family members to name one thing that they are grateful for. A daily gratitude practice is a great way to keep a positive perspective.

Building and maintaining family and community connections is important work; it is the basis for creating a fair and peaceful world. I invite you to come and build connections by playing games together. Our next Game Night will be on Saturday, April 16 at 6:00 PM in the Fellowship Hall, families welcome. # We're Almost There

Your Search Committee has exciting news. By the time you read this, we will have chosen the candidate we will present to you in May! However, we won't find out until sometime between April 7<sup>th</sup> and April 10<sup>th</sup> whether our chosen candidate has also chosen us.

Here's the process: We will let the Transitions Office know who we want by April 4<sup>th</sup>, and we will make the offer on April 7<sup>th</sup> at noon. That's when all the congregations will make their offers. While we hope our candidate will immediately say YES!, there are a few days for considering the offer.

If we and our candidate are a match, we'll let you know we have a candidate at church on Sunday, April 10<sup>th</sup>. However, we won't be able to tell you who it is until we run a background check, negotiate the terms, talk with additional references, and some paperwork. As soon as we possibly can, we will let you know who we are respectfully bringing to you for your consideration.

We have a tentative candidating week set up from May 7 to May 15. Both Sundays the candidate will preach, and we'd like to encourage you now to clear your calendars to plan to be there, especially for the second Sunday. That's the day we'll vote on whether to call the candidate. In between the Sundays, the candidate will attend various special meetings of committees in order to get acquainted. These will not be meetings for regular business, but rather the agenda would be to get to know each other.

We are looking for a unanimous vote in favor of the candidate!

It's possible the week may shift slightly, depending on the candidate we choose, but we will let you know as soon as possible so you can make your plans.

Thanks for hanging in there with us, and for trusting us with this incredibly important decision. This has been a high-integrity process in which all of us have been fully engaged, and we are very impressed by the individuals we have interviewed.

We can't wait to tell you more!!!

### Saturday April 2 10AM: Join Us for an 8.2-Mile Hike to Meyers Cottage in Garin Park

Bob Simoni will lead another hike in Garin Park. We'll start at the trailhead entrance on Ziele Creek Drive in Hayward where parking is free. We'll first hike downhill past Garin Barn to Meyers Cottage on the hilltop trail and then back to Garin Barn following Dry Creek. That's a total of 5.5 miles. We could have the picnic lunch at Meyer's Cottage or Garin Barn. To hike back up to the trail entrance from Garin Barn is another 2.7 miles for a total of 8.2 miles. If some people don't want to end the hike with this somewhat arduous climb, they could arrange to have a friend continue on and then drive back to the Garin Barn lot and get them (or you could do a car shuttle before the hike so a car is waiting at the Garin Barn lot, which is the park's main entrance).

This hike is also listed with the hiking group from the UU Churches in Redwood City and Palo Alto ,so it's a good opportunity to meet fellow UUs from nearby churches. Bring lunch, water, and good shoes. Additional water and bathrooms are available at Garin Barn and Meyer's Cottage. Hiking shoes and a hiking pole are recommended.
