Interim Minister's Farewell Column

The time has come for me to say “goodbye” to you. I will attend the annual General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association from June 20th through 26th, and then return to the office for one more week. My last Sunday among you will be July 3rd. On July 5th, I will get the surgery on my foot I have needed for years that some of you have heard about, and after my recovery time, I will begin an interim ministry with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Marin.

These past two interim years have been a very busy time for this congregation, and for me as your interim minister. Much has been accomplished in our time together. Just a few of the many events and accomplishments were: a celebration of 60 years as a Unitarian Universalist congregation with a special service and lunch the fall of 2014, cottage meetings that explored the congregation's strengths and challenges as well as members' preferences regarding various aspects of church life, a recent Visioning workshop in which some specific, measurable and achievable goals were identified, a renewed Adult Religious Education Committee, an every-member face-to-face-canvass with trained canvassers this year that resulted in close to 10% in increased pledge income, and a long and fruitful search for your next called, settled minister.

Looking back on it all—the services, workshops, training sessions, committee meetings, pastoral ministry, adult seminars, meals together, the look back at where this church has come from historically and ahead to its promising future—I have thoroughly enjoyed being a part of the life of this congregation.

One task of interim ministry that is always difficult, but must be undertaken as the transitional time comes to an end, is for the interim minister to say a fond “farewell” and then to leave quite completely. For 25 years before I became an interim minister 14 years ago, I was a settled minister, and though settled ministers must also at some point bid farewell to the congregations they serve, they don't usually start out knowing when the eventual “good-byes” will be uttered. We interims know from the outset that “hello” will all-too-quickly be followed by “goodbye.” But despite the fact that we are “temps,” we come to feel connected to the congregations we serve, as a minister, interim or otherwise, naturally does with a congregation. I have felt a deep connection to you during these past two years. But now, I must sever that connection and make way for your new minister, Rev. Maria Cristina, who will form that special bond with you.

Offering a fond farewell is a bittersweet, but necessary, task. Already I have been bidding farewell to various committees and groups as I begin to meet with each for the last time. My final “goodbye” to you all will be at the Sunday service on July 3rd.

Please know that I will carry you in my heart to the next congregation I serve, and that being your minister for this brief time has been very enriching for me. As I leave, I have great faith that you will thrive and grow as a congregation. May your summer be restful, and your future bright!

South Hayward Parish News by Teri Owens



The food pantry serves 80 to 100 families a day. Several years ago, three to five people could prepare and distribute food for 15 to 30 families, but it now takes five to nine people working from 8:30 am to 1 pm to receive food and stock the shelves, and another crew of seven to nine people working from 2:30 to 5:30 pm distributing food four days a week. Community volunteers work over 1,000 hours monthly to make this all happen!

The CAN (Community Action Network), serves about six to ten new people each month. South Hayward Parish (SWP) starts working with each new client by performing an assessment and putting together a self-sufficiency plan for each one, identifying the services that person needs to gain access to.

The Family Resource Center (FRC) fields problems that don't fit neatly into categories. In the city of Hayward "it is against the law to be poor or homeless." What the rest of us think of as a safety net isn't catching people, but SHP is. One woman who received a three-day eviction notice, and her husband was not providing support. SHP was able to provide information to get her through the immediate crisis. FRC helps over 70 people per week get showers, up to 20 per day.

The winter warming shelter was open this year for 46 nights, serving 88 individuals, aged from 19 to 80. The last night there were 10 cars in the parking lot, with families sleeping in them. For next year, SHP would like to try to be open every night and try to offer access to additional services.

SHP really needs more volunteer support. With the East Bay eviction rate increasing as communities gentrify and landlords try to increase their rental revenues, we need people who can help process legal action opposing the evictions and refer victims to support programs. Also, with growing list of supporting food donors, more drivers are needed to help pick up food.

Special Activities

Fall Mystery Dinner Call for Help (October 15 and 16)

At our recent Committee Fair, Glenn Jacob volunteered to become the new chairperson on the fund raising committee. He has been involved in many of our past fund raisers and has been a Mystery Dinner writer/director, Auctioneer and a bingo caller.

The plan for fund raising for the upcoming church fiscal year is to have two "big" fund raisers during the church year; The mystery Dinner in the Fall, and the Service Auction in the Spring. I am hoping we can do maybe one or two "small" fund raisers, maybe in summer and winter. (We don't want to "nickel and dime" people to death!)

Glenn would love your suggestions for these events. One suggestion already received is for a bingo.

The event currently being planned is the new Mystery Dinner. The script is written, and Glenn is getting the cast together. It will feature some old faces, as well as some who have not been in our shows before.

The show dates will be: An evening show on Saturday, October 15 and an afternoon matinee on October 16.

The exact times are TBA. The show is called: "Lights, Camera... Murder!" and features a cast of unusual characters behind the scenes of a big Hollywood movie production. It should be a fun dinner theater event.

Help is needed! We need a volunteer to be in charge of the dinner portion of the show. This volunteer would be in charge of putting together a team for set up, cooking, serving, and clean up.

It would be a big job, but everyone always seems to have a great time! We are hoping that the movie would be themed based on what you might find on a movie set, the "Craft Service", and we might invite the audience to "Come as your favorite movie star." There is lots of room for creativity and fun!
