

From our founding fathers to women's suffrage to voter registration across all 50 states, Unitarian Universalists have a long history of supporting our democracy. Often times, political debates can create fear and division.

This election season, we encourage you to keep heart and vote your values by putting your Unitarian Universalist principles into practice when deciding which political candidate deserves your vote.

Here are seven questions based on our *seven Principles* to ask candidates when choosing who will get your vote in this year's local, state, and national elections:

- Do your policy proposals reflect the inherent worth and dignity of every person?
- If elected, how will your everyday decisions demonstrate justice, equity and compassion in human relations?
- How will you encourage acceptance and growth in one another across party lines?
- What insights have you learned from your own search for truth and meaning that will guide you as a political leader?
- What ideas do you have to improve our democratic process?
- Within our international community, how will you work towards a goal of world community with peace, liberty and justice for all?
- Acknowledging our interdependence, how will your decisions impact our planet and future generations?"

# Welcome, Reverend Maria Cristina!

On May 15, 2016, the 80+ members of the congregation present, voted unanimously to call the *Rev. Dr. Maria Cristina Vlassidis Burgoa* to be our minister, and she accepted the call! Here are some of the slides used to present her to the congregation, for those of you not able to meet her during candidating week, or who missed seeing the display in our lobby for the last month. Just FYI, she prefers to be called Rev. Maria Cristina.



### **REV. DOCTOR MARIA CRISTINA**

Rev. Maria Cristina <u>Vlassidis</u> <u>Burgoa</u> immigrated to the United States from Chile in the late 1970s. She holds a Law Degree from the City University of New York School of Law, a Master of Divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School, and has just successfully defended her doctoral dissertation in the Religion, Gender, and Culture Program at Harvard University. On May 26<sup>th</sup> she will be awarded the degree of Doctor in Theology.

On September 22, 2013, Rev. Maria Cristina was ordained to the Unitarian Universalist Ministry, by First Parish Cambridge Unitarian Universalist church. For the past three years, she has been serving as Assistant Minister at First Parish in Brookline, Massachusetts. In November of 2015, the MFC granted her first renewal towards final fellowship.

With more than three decades of work experience related to social justice, Rev. Maria Cristina received her call to Unitarian Universalist ministry while working in an AIDS hospice. Her professional experience includes working with mothers in prison, people living with HIV/AIDS, immigrants, survivors of domestic violence, people living with traumatic brain injury, multicultural community organizations, and children with disabilities. Her volunteer work as advocate and community organizer includes working with the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender non-conforming, and two-spirit communities. Rev. Maria Cristina has a son, Erick, and lives with her mother, Lily and their two cats: Tobias and <u>Rafiki</u>. She enjoys quilting, photography, gardening, and teaching Spanish through music and dance.

# Small Group Ministry Volunteers at Alameda County Food Bank

Our Wednesday afternoon Small Group Ministry (SGM) members learned a lot about hunger in Alameda County when we volunteered for a three-hour shift at the Alameda County Community Food Bank (ACCFB) in Oakland on May 11.

The need to feed people in Alameda County is tremendous. The ACCFB serves 1 in 5 Alameda County residents. The continuing effects of the great recession of 2008 and growing income inequality have put a tremendous strain on families that cannot survive without this food.

The ACCFB is the main collector and distributor of food to various client charitable organizations in the county. The client charitable organizations and local food banks receive all perishable food from ACCFB for free, while paying only 15 cents per pound for all other food. South Hayward Parish and FESCO are among 240 community organizations that receive food from the ACCFB.

ACCFB distributed 34 million pounds of food in 2015, over 25 million meals. The ACCFB now spends over \$4 million on food purchases each year. Most of that money comes from individual contributions. The federal government provides only 15% of their food budget, and food barrel donations are an even smaller part of their food processing operation. ACCFB does a fantastic job squeezing their funds to provide healthy, balanced food to those in need. Most of the food purchased, processed, and distributed is fresh produce. They are able to purchase their fresh produce at an average price of 15 cents per pound and all other food goods at an average price of 65 cents per pound—thus turning every \$1 of donations into \$6 of food.

Though the ACCFB has their own paid staff, they could not possibly process and distribute all of this food without volunteers. Each day they run two 3-hour shifts of volunteers, involving 15,000 volunteers providing 95,000 volunteer hours annually. Our Wednesday afternoon SGM members spent their shift bagging fresh carrots and oranges with a couple dozen other volunteers. At the end of our shift we learned that we had bagged 11,400 pounds of produce, enough for 9400 meals.

Our Wednesday afternoon group is one of three SGM groups at Starr King. Our group--Evelyn Cormier, Marge Schwab, Terry Hunt, Beverly Powell, Kathryn Lamar, Chris Crandell ,and Bob Britton--has met twice a month for two hours since October, exploring spiritual, religious, and philosophical issues, while also finding deep intimacy and community with each other. One vehicle for building that closeness and community is doing a service project like our volunteer shift at the food bank. If you long for greater connections and deeper friendships at Starr King, talk to one of our members to see if this might work for you.

# **Prepare for the Committee Fair!**

Sunday, June 5, immediately following the service, we will be hosting our annual Committee Fair. This is where each of the committees that together run our congregational life, present themselves to you, describe their activities for you, and solicit new members for the coming church year that starts on July 5.

Here is a list of the current committees that could be represented at the fair, along with short descriptions of their functions.

**Finance Committee:** The Finance Committee, prepares a proposed annual operating budget for submission to the Board of Trustees. This Committee also maintains pledge records, reporting to the Treasurer as required and has the general responsibility for fundraising and for asset investment.

**Worship Committee:** The Worship Committee's mission is to enhance the worship life of the church. This is accomplished through the support of the professional ministry with preparation, research, assistance, and co-creation of lay-led worship.

**Religious Education Committee:** The Religious Education Committee is responsible for activities and classes in the children's program, including curricula, objectives and standards. It arranges for a Director of Religious Education and all necessary staff and supplies to carry out this program.

Adult RE Committee: The purpose of the Starr King Adult Religious Education (RE) Committee is to develop a variety of classes, workshops, or seminars which will nurture and stimulate the spiritual and personal growth of our adult church community.

**Hospitality and Membership Committee:** This committee ensures a welcoming, hospitable, and inviting environment for all. It develops the means (or methods) by which people enter and participate in the life of the community and become members as they are ready.

**Pastoral Care Committee:** The Pastoral Care Committee's primary task is to attend to the spiritual and material needs of any congregant facing a personal crisis. To this end the committee provides meals, transportation, and cards. The members also make telephone calls of concern or condolence, visit congregants in nursing homes, hospitals or those confined to their home; and keeps a list of Durable Medical Equipment which can be borrowed from the members of the congregation.

Anti Racism Multicultural Alliance (ARMCA): ARMCA sponsors programs, events, workshops, and classes to increase awareness of conscious and unconscious racism and the unearned advantages that constitute White privilege.

# The <u>Peace and Justice Action Team (PAJAT)</u> works to address state, national, and global issues relevant to our shared passions and principles.

**Green Sanctuary:** Our UU 7th principle is respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part. Green Sanctuary aims to bring this principle alive in our modern congregational and personal lives. The committee is guided by principles, goals, and educational materials from the UU Earth Ministry, which has accredited Starr King UU congregation as a Green Sanctuary. To support these principles and to maintain this accreditation, the committee works to build awareness of the significance and complexity of environmental issues, encourages personal lifestyle changes, engages in community action on environmental issues, strengthens the connection between spiritual practice and earth consciousness, and works to heal environmental injustices.

**Usher Committee:** The key objectives of the ushers are to ensure that congregrants have a peaceful worship experience, and ensuring that ushers are available each Sunday as well as for Memorials

**Social Committee:** We would like to resurrect our Social Committee, to coordinate our various efforts allowing for community members to socialize and get acquainted with each other. We already have a number of social activities sponsored by individuals or groups (e.g., ARMCA movie night, a hiking club, game night, monthly Sunday brunches), we just need a committee responsible for ensuring that we have a continuing, balanced social program!

**Interior Committee:** This committee ensures a clean functioning environment for all church members and activities, by arranging and maintaining organized storage for all kitchen, bathroom, dining, and cleaning supplies, and ensuring that coffee is present and in proper supply; scheduling and supervising floor and carpet cleaning; and ensuring that for each event there are appropriate supplies, space, organization of set up, clean up, lock up. In addition, a gift coordinator, in cooperation with the minister, evaluates whether in-kind gifts are truly of use to the church, acknowledges gifts that are accepted, and rejects with thanks any gifts that are not needed.

**Grounds Committee:** The Grounds Committee maintains the church grounds, keeps all church areas safe, and improves the grounds with new plants, keeping weeds under control.

**Buildings and Maintenance Committee:** The tentative goals of the newly reconstituted Buildings and Maintenance Committee's tentative goals are to monitor the buildings and property; identify any problems with the condition of Starr King UU Church buildings and property; prioritize maintenance tasks; determine course of action regarding maintenance tasks, including identifying church members who will help out); and communicate costs to the Board of Trustees for their consideration and approval
