The Miracle of Hanukkah

The story of the First Hanukkah tells us that Judah Maccabee gathered the people and told them to go up to Jerusalem and purify the Temple in to prepare for worship. When they arrived in Jerusalem they found the Temple deserted, its gates burned down, destroyed. The people in their distress began to lament to see their temple in ruins. Judah brought a new menorah, as the people gathered new rocks to build the altar. However, they could not find enough oil to properly light the Menorah. Together, they looked for and found a jar of oil that should not have even existed. And then a miracle: the lights lit from that one small jar of oil burned for eight days straight. And so they made it a law to celebrate the festival of lights to commemorate the restoration of the temple and the miracle of Hanukkah.

Hanukkah offers us three lessons:

Rededication: What is it in my life that I value but have in someway fallen away from or am not taking care of? It could be a relationship with a spouse, child, or friend; it could be a volunteer activity for a social or political cause; it could be making time regularly for spiritual practice.

The power of faith: The miracle of Hanukkah is that the people, knowing the oil could not possibly last for the desired duration of their celebration, lit the flame anyway. It was at that moment, when the light was first kindled, that the miracle occurred in their hearts.

The power of community: While we may not be able to achieve our goals or overcome our challenges alone, if we are part of a spiritual community, we can.

Before the restoration, the temple had been burnt down, covered with overgrown weeds, and remained desolate and dark for three years.

Sometimes in our lives things fall apart. Relationships are broken, our bodies become fragile, connections are lost, regret, cynicism, and despair grow strong while our inner light grows weak and we experience hopelessness. And the light of true hope can only emerge when we embrace the darkness. Now more than ever, we need the light of true hope.

John Schneider, a trauma psychologist, writes

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"Perhaps the most important dimension of witnessing is our ability to hold hope for another . . . Sometimes people say, 'I can't imagine ever recovering from this' or 'Do you ever think it will be better?' or 'Can I make it?'

When our own light goes out, it takes another person to help us rekindle it. The real miracle is the human connection. Hope lives in the borderlands, at the crossroads, in the darkness, where we find each other, when we bear witness, and lament together. There in the darkness, amidst the ruins, we restore the broken places, we gather new rocks, and we rededicate ourselves to the task of restoring the light. Arise! Shine! for your light has come said the prophet Isaiah. You might be asking where is my light? Everywhere I turn I see people lamenting. Where is my light? Can I find it among the ruins? Arise! Shine! For I also see a new movement, new leaders, a new vision for this country that has been playing in the dark for too long. I see people standing on the side of love, keeping hope alive. This Hanukkah I see rededication to peace, to justice, to freedom. And I see hope being born of the ashes, from the shards and the brokenness, and I see hope resurrected like a miracle, among the ruins.

Arise! Shine! You are the divine spark!

So come down from the hills and declare victory even when the temple is wrecked. You are the stuff from which such miracles are made!

At the end of last year, we introduced the Latin American Christmas tradition of Las Posadas to the congregation. In the new year the children will learn about Sihkism and visit the Sihk Gurdwara in Hayward where we have been welcomed thanks to our connections with the Eden Interfaith Council. Another issue to tackle in the new year is our church babysitting policy. Although we want to make childcare available for church members to attend church events, we have limited resources. I want to simplify the process. But, in order to take the responsibility off of committees, I need the help of a babysitting coordinator. So, if you know someone who is a good organizer and communicator, please let me know. The time commitment will be about one half-hour per event.

Babysitting (Childcare) Coordinator Responsibilities

- Be the point person for babysitting requests
- Call or email babysitters on the designated list
- Notify requestor if a babysitter is or is not available
- Cancel babysitter within 24 hours of event if services are no longer needed
- Work with DRE to expand provider list within safety guidelines

January 2017 Report

The Safety Committee wants to thank everyone who has and is helping to make Starr King a safe place for all our members and guests.

We want to personally thank some people who have been actively engaged in furthering our safety objectives.

Lavon Hodges and the Ushers, especially for their work in keeping the sanctuary aisles and exits clear. Karen Cook for her help with the new "FIRE" Buckets; Darryl Ray and the Buildings Committee for the tasks they have completed and the many tasks on which they are working; Roy Dickerson; Walt Korus, Dirk Dino and Will Fitch for volunteering to act as monitors/guides during drills and evacuations, and of course Rev. Maria Cristina for her suggestions and support.

We will be looking for others who wish to volunteer for the various tasks which will affect the success of the Starr King's Safety Program.

For instance, we will be seeking volunteers, to act as partners to one or more of our members who might need extra help during a drill or evacuation.

As we mentioned last month, we are planning a second round of training for use of the AED machine. If interested, please sign up on the back table in the fellowship hall. On the same sheet please indicate if you have already taken AED training or CPR training. Also let us know what day or evening you would prefer. The training takes about 3-4 hours.

While it is sometimes difficult to adapt to change, there are some things which are necessary, eithe because they are required by local ordinances and/or because they improve the safety of our site for all who utilize it. One of these requirements is that any type of exit or passageway which leads to an exit must have a width of at least 36". We would ask that whenever you are on the church site, whether during a service, attending a meeting, enjoying the after church refreshments, attending a community meal or at any other time, please be vigilant and cooperative about keeping all means of egress at least 36" wide. All these passageways should be clear of anything which might impede someone's ability to exit in case of an emergency.

Just as a "heads up," there will be an evacuation drill sometime this spring. A Congregational Meeting will be held prior to the drill to explain the procedures to be followed.

Small Group Ministry

Why Small Group Ministry?

Did you join Starr King Church because you wanted to serve on a committee? Probably not! You just might have been looking for a spiritual community where you can share your values and engage in a common search for truth, love and justice. Probably if you were asked what you seek in a church you would respond that you are looking for community, inspiration, intellectual stimulation, and support for your spiritual journey.

Small Group Ministry (SGM) provides a place and structure to discuss spiritual and philosophical topics while building deep and lasting personal relationships. Do you ever wish you could discuss a sermon at church in more detail? Do you ever wish you had time to make connections to church members that lasted more than a few minutes over coffee? Do you ever want to share something deeply personal that won't fit on those little pink slips? Why that is the purpose of SGM!

What exactly is Small Group Ministry?

- **Spiritual seeking.** To deepen our spiritual lives and build on the benefits we receive from our regular worship services.
- **Community-building**. To foster positive connections among newer friends and long-time members of our congregation.
- Ministry. To extend the ministry at Starr King by caring for and ministering to one another.
- **Intellectual exploration**. To expand our understanding of the world and ways to demonstrate Unitarian Universalist principles in our lives.
- **Living our values.** To engage in service projects to benefit the church community, the neighborhood, or the larger society.

Small Group Ministry is not:

- A social club, although ties between church members deepen through SGM.
- A debate society, although many important topics are discussed.
- A support or therapy group, although the atmosphere is positive.
- A worship service, although there is a strong spiritual aspect to the meeting structure and topics.
- A rigid template of activities, although there are general guidelines to follow.
- A closed "fraternity", although groups must be limited in size to be effective.

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Our Adult Religious Education Committee (AREC), in collaboration with Reverend Maria Cristina, has been meeting to explore ways to revitalize and sustain SGM at Starr King Church. In December we met with Julia Rodriguez of the San Jose First Unitarian Church to learn about their very successful SGM program. Easily a majority of congregants at their church are participating in SGM. Our AREC will be meeting again after the holidays to evaluate what we learned and making plans going forward.

Many of you have already participated in SGM at Starr King and expressed an interest in continued participation. If you have not yet participated in SGM and are interested or would like to learn more, please contact Bob Britton, Kathryn LaMar, Diane Meyerson, or Mileva Lewis.
