On the evening of December 10th, we gathered to celebrate our first Las Posadas at Starr King UU Church. The invitations had been sent out, the songs had been rehearsed, and the food and hot chocolate awaited hungry pilgrims. We had no idea if people would show up. How would this new tradition be received? And slowly, as the sun went down, more and more people arrived. As I was lighting the luminarias by the entrance, a couple came through the gates and excitedly announced that they were neighbors and wanted to join us to learn more about Las Posadas and to be in community. As it got darker, we lit our candles and what a sight to see children of all ages donning angel and shepherd costumes! As we processed towards the first house up the hill, at one point I looked back and saw this magical vision of dozens of people walking together and singing by candlelight.

We made an impromptu stop and without a second thought, performed our songs and connected with this family. We hugged, exchanged greetings and blessings, and invited them over to church for dinner. This was the spirit of Las Posadas where no one remained a stranger.

We returned to church where the doors were opened wide for all and everyone was welcomed to enjoy more music, delicious food, and a piñata filled with candy for the children. The fellowship hall exuded hospitality and warmth. My heart was overwhelmed with gratitude and joy and I was moved to tears as I witnessed the miracle of beloved community in the making. I enjoyed singing Christmas carols and was especially grateful to meet our neighbors and to get to know Grace and her daughter Milagro, who is a gifted piano player.

RE Reflections

January Theme: New Beginnings Featured Faith Tradition: Buddhism

Happy New Year! I find it helpful at this time to reflect on the year that has ended, to let go of what was negative, and to set a positive intention for the year ahead. It is an opportunity to forgive ourselves for mistakes we have made, learn from them, and move forward.

Sometimes we have to begin again to get where we are meant to be. The life of the Buddha is a prime example of the power of new beginnings. Siddartha's father, the king, attempted to control his son's fate by keeping him sequestered in the palace, removed from worldly suffering. When Siddartha escaped from his confines and discovered the true nature of suffering, he felt compelled to run away and figure out for himself how to overcome it. Thus, he began a journey that led him to become the great holy man he was destined to be and to discover the path to enlightenment.

When Siddhartha was born, a wise man predicted, "If the prince remains in the royal household, he will become a great king. But if he leaves the household, he will find Truth and become a great holy man." King Suddodana envisioned Siddhartha as a holy man: giving up all worldly possessions, a wandering teacher with a begging bowl. That was not the life he wanted for his only son, so he surrounded his son with everything he would ever need or want.

When he was 29, Siddhartha left the palace to explore. On his journey, he encountered old age, illness and death for the first time. He could not understand the purpose of such suffering.

Finally he met a holy man in saffron robes. The prince asked, "Who are you?" The man replied, "I am a monk, a seeker of Truth, of life over death. To find it, I have given up everything on this earth." Siddhartha decided he must do the same if he was to find peace.

He spent the next six years living as an ascetic. Asceticism taught that the way to Truth was to deny the body. Ascetics denied themselves food and comfort and lived as hermits. Yet, after six years, Siddhartha felt no closer to the Truth. He decided that Truth was not to be found in extreme circumstances or by denying the body, but through the mind and the heart. From that day forward, he chose to follow a middle path of moderation.

After six years of seeking, one day Siddhartha came to a bodhi tree and sat down beneath it, vowing not to leave until he knew the Truth of how to conquer suffering and death. While meditating and searching his heart, he came to understand how he was connected to all life, and how to conquer suffering and death. He had become the Buddha—the awakened one.

Adult Religious Education

January Session: Governance & Decision Making at SKUU 21 January, 2018 noon – 2pm in the Sanctuary

- Learn how we are part of and supported by the Unitarian Universalist Associations

Planning for Future Adult RE

At our January meeting we will establish our priorities for the year by reviewing the topics that you said were of interest to you. These included: further exploration of our UU history, our place in contemporary society, and health related topics such as Dementia, Cognitive Problems with Alzheimer's Disease, Advocating for Yourself with your Physician, Getting the Most out of your Health Care Provider Visit, and the End of Life Option Act in California.

Many of us have worked and worshipped in environments that were "top-down" in nature. This way is not consistent with our views of fairness and justice and the values of our UU tradition. In her book *Women's Way of Knowing*, Margaret Wheatly started a conversation about different styles of leadership describing the power of collaboration and consensus building and decision making. Similarly, Juana Bordas in her book, *Salsa, Soul, and Spirit: Leadership for a Multicultural Age*, addresses new approaches to leadership from Latino, Black, and American Indian Communities. We have asked Rev. María Cristina to lead us in discussing leadership from this new perspective. Yes, we will dance the Salsa and make salsa!

February 25: **Membership - "Signing the Book."** When you "Signed the Book" signifying your joining SKUUC and all UUs across the world, what did it mean to you then? What's changed? How we each perceive the rights, responsibilities, and joys of membership at Starr King.
