From the Minister

Beloveds,

On Sunday, September 8 we will gather once again for our annual Water Ceremony. This ceremony calls us to honor the power of community, of individuals coming together like rivers to the sea, to form a collective committed to Justice. It is a calling that reminds us that we are united by our thirst for Justice, by our UU Principles and Congregational Covenant, and by our deep abiding unconditional Love for each other, our communities, and by our solidarity with all people who are suffering.

This Summer I was blessed with many opportunities to recharge energies and revitalize my commitment to continue building the Beloved Community among the good people of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church in Hayward. From attending General Assembly, to visiting friends and family in Puerto Rico, to spending quiet time meditating by the ocean, and reading and reflecting in preparation for our new church year, I am grateful for all the ways I have experienced spiritual renewal.



It was powerful being in Puerto Rico right after a popular uprising successfully ousted the Governor after his homophobic and misogynistic comments became public. More than a million people from all walks of life took to the streets for 12 consecutive days demanding an end to corruption and forcing the Governor and many of his aides to resign. After Hurricane Maria which left more than 4,600 people dead and hundreds of thousands of homes destroyed, the people of Puerto Rico have said "Enough!" This little but mighty nation is such an inspiration! While in Puerto Rico I also got to attend two religious services with communities that made a big impression on me because of their commitment to social justice and every day practice of their values: The Church Without Walls and the Bahai Community. Last but not least, I had the honor of visiting SAGE Puerto Rico, the first community organization offering services and support to seniors from the LGBTQ+ communities through the ongoing support of Waves Ahead, Inc. So far, they have helped to rebuild 21 homes and offer free therapeutic services throughout the island. There may be a whole sermon series inspired by these experiences, so stay tuned!

Beloveds, I hope you have also been blessed by the love of family and friends, the beauty of nature, and the every day miracles that give us strength and joy for the journey. Strength to bear the loss of a loved one, to be a source of support for someone who is grieving, to be of help when someone is going through a difficult time, and to move forward even in the face of uncertainty, fear, and devastation. Strength to continue our efforts to denounce the inhuman treatment of immigrants and refugees being kept in cages and suffering the separation from their loved ones. And Joy to express gratitude for our friends and families and for the many gifts we receive from Mother Earth.

As we prepare to greet another year together:

May we be blessed with a renewed commitment to continue building a spiritual home that is a source of inspiration, strength, companionship, hope, and healing for us, our families, neighbors, and communities.

May we gather once again in Peace and Love to express gratitude and to share our joys, sorrows, and hopes.

I look forward to beginning another year of Shared Ministry with you!

South Hayward Parish

South Hayward Parish Is Facing a Crisis – Possible Solution Found

On June 14th the Board of SHP was notified that as of Dec 31st, we will lose our home at the Westminster Hills/New Bridges Outreach Center in Hayward.

Our landlord, and one of our founding member congregations, New Bridges Presbyterian (merged West Minster Hills/Mt Eden churches), must sell the property. They have supported SHP for years by allowing of the use of the space at a rent far below market value.

Since the merger which created New Bridges, they have been maintaining two very large campuses (their congregational home; and the Outreach Center). Now they need to sell the Outreach Center property, and we understand. We thank them for their support of the work of SHP over so many years.

Since our notice in June, the Board and Staff of SHP have been looking at various options which would allow us to continue our important work. It seems clear that renting a new space at market value would be out of reach for the resources of a small non-profit such as SHP. For this reason, the Board is exploring a strategic alliance with a larger organization(much as FESCO joined with La Familia a few years ago). With greater financial stability, this alliance would allow SHP to move forward and continue our important work.

These talks are ongoing and details cannot be shared at this time. The Board hopes that we will have definite news within the next month. The Board and Staff consider this alliance to be an exciting new chapter for SHP, and a solution to the crisis.

We still need you! SHP will continue to exist and we will continue to need your support, both spiritual and financial. Fundraising and our donor base will continue to be a major portion of our budget within this new framework. Likewise, all volunteers will continue.

With your help, this new plan should allow us to continue to feed the hungry, comfort the homeless and fight for social justice. We will be providing more details in the near future.

Envisioning Our Future

Sunday, September 29, 2019 12:15pm to 2:15pm in the Sanctuary

Earlier this year, members of the Starr King community met to share our values, the times when Starr King was at its best and what we dream about for our future. Our visioning was designed to help us *Discover* "our best moments" and to *Dream* about our desired future. The assumptions of our planning process are:



- All the wisdom and skills needed to assess the past and present and to envision the future we want to create were in the room.
- There are many "right" pathways to reach a given point or end result.
- None of us has all the answers; we need each other's perspective of reality to get a better understanding of the whole.
- The future doesn't just happen. It results in large part from what we do or don't do today and every day.

You gave the Envisioning Team a lot of information to review and synthesize. In fact, you gave us 4,207 words! We will ask you to:

Review the values that SKUUC members said guide us as Unitarian Universalists. While we use the UU Seven Principles as guides, many come from other faith traditions or no faith tradition and have other language for values that resonates with them. Language matters. We'll ask you to review the numerous values you named and to identify those that most resonate with those that will serve as a guide or compass as we, as a spiritual community, choose the priorities for our ministry for the next two to three years.

Review your Dreams in the following areas and choose your highest priorities:

- **Building a Better World.** Working for justice, equity, and compassion in human affairs through prophetic witness and action.
- Caring Community. The warmth and care of our beloved community is one of our greatest strengths Caring Community
- Family Ministry and RE. Supporting our families and our children is a vital part of our mission.
 Adult RE lifelong learning is also a vibrant part of our mission. Learning keeps us alive, responsive, engaged.
- **Worship** is the single most important thing we do together. It's what distinguishes us from a support group, a social club, or a political action group. It's what makes us a church.

Each one of us can

- Make a difference
- Learn from each other
- Pool our perceptions
- Join together to create our future
