

Indigenous People's Day: Awareness






Church Common Read

Mistakes and Miracles, Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism

In light of the leading value that came up for us in our Envisioning Process – **Radical Hospitality, Welcoming, Multiculturalism, Inclusion, Celebrating Diversity** – our common read this year is *Mistakes and Miracles, Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism* by Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones of the First Unitarian Church of San Jose and Karin Lin of First Parish Cambridge.

The UUA bookstore says of this book:

What calls Unitarian Universalists to create multicultural, antiracist Beloved Community? What do congregations need when they embark on this journey? What common threads run through their stories? Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin – a white minister and a lay person of color – share how five diverse congregations encounter frustrations and disappointments, as well as hope and wonder, once they commit to the journey.



Mistakes abound. Miracles of transformation and joy emerge too. Extensively researched and thoughtfully written – with reflection questions at the end of each chapter – *Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism* will guide readers to apply these stories to their own communities, develop next steps, and renew their commitment to this hard but meaningful work.

We're privileged to have one of the authors, Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones, preach at our church on February 23rd and lead a discussion afterwards!

If you want a more in-depth discussion, come to book group on the **1st and 3rd Mondays at 7:15** in the sanctuary beginning November 4. We'll have 8 sessions, one for each chapter. This is a special series of "Book Group+". Everyone is welcome!

Farewell to SKIT

This month marks the end of one of Starr King UU church's longest running social activity groups

SKIT (Starr King Improvisational Theater) was started by Bill Schwab sometime around 1990. When I started coming to the church in 1994, it had already been running for a few years. As I got to know Bill, and he discovered my interest in theater, he of course invited me to join the group. I was working swing shift at the time, and could not participate in any evening groups. But eventually I did join around 1997 or so, and have loved it ever since.

Bill's signature SKIT was called "What's-it's" where he would bring in a few of his collection of mysterious antique do-dads, and you would have to try to tell a story that would explain what the mystery item was. We were usually stumped until finally Bill would explain what the thing really was.

One highlight of my memories of SKIT, was the first time the group performed in public in front of a large audience. We played at a FESCO benefit show that was held in the auditorium of Mureau High-School. It was thrilling and terrifying!

Over the years, many wonderful church members have been part of SKIT. Mary Lasack, Jean Gaylord, Sandra Walton, and Hans and Arlette LeGrand just to name a few.

After Bill could no longer participate, we started using a rotating schedule of SKIT leaders. When it was your turn, you would decide what improv games to perform. We would choose among old favorites, as well as new activities borrowed by such shows as "Who's Line is it Anyway?" More recently SKIT did a couple of shows at Chanticlears Theater in Castro Valley. We performed at an improv competition called "Night of the Nerds". and we also served as the entertainment for a recent annual awards show. SKIT also performed at many church functions and special services.

Often, friends and guests have come to SKIT night, but for the past few years, the core SKIT group has been myself, Bill and Ruth DeSmidt, Stuart Fink and Betsy Dye. Now with Betsy gone, and Stuart planning to move away in a few months, there are not enough core members to sustain the group.

The final regularly scheduled SKIT show will be Thursday November 14 from 7:30– 9:00PM. We will feature our "Greatest hits" and favorite SKITS. We hope that some folks will join us for this last Hurrah (and some Ha Ha Ha's)

I'm sure we will still get together for special events from time to time.

We have had so much fun, and so many laughs over the course of almost 30 years. Recently at Betsy's memorial, I was congratulating William and Cloe Dye on what fine public speakers they had become. They both said that the times that Betsy had brought them to SKIT and encouraged them to participate made them less afraid to speak out, and better at public speaking.

I too credit Improv for making me less shy, and better at acting, better at talking to people at work, and a better Worship associate.

So long and farewell to SKIT.
