We dance because our ancestors danced even when doing so they risked their lives.

Bits from Your Board

"As Unitarian Universalists, we – the Board and Congregation of Starr King UU Church - affirm the inherent worth and dignity of each person and specifically condemn the murder of George Floyd and police violence against black people. It is time to renew our core beliefs and use them to guide our actions. George Floyd's death is a stark reminder that change is needed. As such, we commit to show up, speak out, and actively work to create what we seek in ourselves and in our community — working to dismantle systematic racism and to build racial justice with accountability. **BLACK LIVES MATTER**.

We have work to do; please join us."

In response to the murder of George Floyd and police violence against black people, both recent and ongoing, the Board has released the above statement and has posted it on our website. This statement speaks directly to us as a congregation and is a continuation of our call for action taken at a special meeting on November 1, 2015 when we approved the Black Lives Matter Resolution. So, now what?

As Reverenda says when she ends each service: "Worship has ended, service has just begun." This is an invitation to you to take anti-racism action and to do service. I like to think of this as being "response- able" — We are able to respond and take action. As an individual and as a congregation, taking notice and then accepting responsibility to take action as full and active members of our congregation and our greater community.

At their June 14th meeting, the Peace and Justice Action Team, at the request of the Board, discussed possible action steps to go beyond our statement and to engage in transformational change. Their current recommendation is to invite each member of our congregation to participate in the 21-day Racial Equity Habit Building Challenge by America and Moore (see below) and to make their commitment public by letting others know. So far, there are nine of us, including myself, who have made their commitment and are participating and tracking our actions. PLEASE JOIN US! It is with mixed emotions that I leave for summer break, knowing that my time as your Director of Religious Education has come to an end. I have enjoyed my five year tenure and I thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve you.

I began the transition from congregant to paid staff when I volunteered to replace outgoing DRE as acting director at the end of 2015. Over the next five years I trained and explored the position. We made many attempts to energize and modernize the program in keeping with the current demographic trends facing all organized religions. We explored and continue to explore the shift from religious exploration to family ministry. One of the most important lessons I have learned is the focus on connection versus perfection.

It was my pleasure to work with the families and children of SKUUC. I particularly appreciate the work of the volunteers who so generously shared their time and talents with us. The members of the RE Council have been invaluable in making the work of family ministry possible. I would also like to express my deep gratitude to Reverenda María Cristina for supervising me, setting goals for the program and for working tirelessly to promote family friendly multigenerational services and stories for all ages. It takes a Unitarian Universalist Village to raise a Unitarian Universalist Child. We are that village.

The UUA has been a trusted source for curriculum and training to support religious educators. I have enjoyed the support and shared resources of my professional colleagues in the Pacific Central District of LREDA (Liberal Religious Educators Association). As I step down from my staff position I will follow the guidance from the LREDA Code of Professional Practices:

When leaving a position of religious education leadership for any reason, I will refrain from being involved in the process of selecting my successor. I will support my successor by leaving room for them to establish their own identity and leadership in the congregation. I will refrain from accepting positions on policy-making bodies in the congregation or community (such as the Board, Religious Education Committee, Finance Committee, or Personnel Committee) for two years after my professional leadership has been concluded in that congregation. For two years, I will not accept or volunteer for roles in the religious education program, and will encourage members of the congregation to speak to the current religious educator or other appropriate persons for answers to all current religious education issues or concerns.
