The New Year announces the coming of the Three Kings, The Magi/Los Reyes Magos, on January 6th, the Feast of the Epiphany. We celebrate their journey and their courage to take a different path. ### **SKUUC Board Notes for the New Year**

Happy Holidays! The board recently had our retreat, and the focus was on both regathering as we get back together and our long-term financial sustainability. We are gradually moving closer to "normal" whatever that is going to mean. We intend to keep the Zoom sessions going as this is a way to include many both near and far who would not be able to join us on Sundays. We are singing and using hymnals again, so we are getting there. We are still concerned about being safe in this time of COVID so the windows are open and the fans turning; you are encouraged to wear a coat this winter. We have plans to meet with the congregation more often than our once-a-year meeting; the plan is to have a quarterly get together after church to discus things; this will help us get your input on things and keep you in the loop.

Money is an issue for us as we are spending more than we are taking in for our annual budget; we are ok for the next few years, but we need to generate funds or cut spending. We are looking into having a pre-school use our space as this would generate income and be in-line with our values. This will be an impact on our use of the church and there will be initial costs, so we are looking at the pros and cons. Another idea is to promote the church for events; this will also be a good way to outreach to the community. Maybe you have ideas as to how we might better utilize the church and grounds to reach out to the community and offset some of our expenses.

We have been spending a lot over the last year or so, but it has been money well spent. We spent a lot on the solar panels, the parking lot, tree trimming, and general cleanup of the grounds and church as we started back up. Most of these costs were outside our operating budget but they were big expenses. We know that these are tough times, and you may not be able to contribute as much as you would like, but please keep in mind what benefits you get from the church as you contribute.

It seems like only yesterday that the church year started but we will soon be looking at filling leadership positions on the board and as we get closer to that "normal" that we have been looking for there is a need for volunteers to reinvigorate things, Things like gardening, sound booth, and other work around the church are a great way to deepen relationships and learn about each other.


