Bits from Your Board

Value Driven Project Planning

On behalf of the Board of Trustees: Mileva Saulo Lewis, Vice-President and Diane Meyerson, Secretary

On 5 December 2021, members of the Board informed the congregation that we were in the very early stages of a project; Investigating the feasibility of a Montessori school in the fellowship hall. We heard your questions about liability and challenges to our non-profit status and taxes. We heard congregational concerns about the impact of such a school on SoUUful Family Ministry. This provisional planning process will guide project planning in the future.¹

OUR DECISIONS will be guided by our values, mission, and vision, and evaluating the project's benefits and risks to:

- The life and well-being of this spiritual community and its various ministries
- Financial health impact on financial sustainability

On 5 January 2022, The Board approved a provisional Project Planning Process designed to be:

- Transparent and Inclusive;
- Responsible and Prudent.

TRANSPARENT AND INCLUSIVE

- Be open and honest with each other and the congregation
- Provide regular ongoing communication with congregation using many methods such as Weekly Announcements, In-person announcements as appropriate; Constant Contact, *The Chalice*
- Encourage congregational feedback
- Listen to multiple stakeholders

RESPONSIBLE AND PRUDENT

- Be Organized Establish a Team and their authority
- Be clear about the "problem to be solved" describe the goal of the project
- Determine criteria by which project will be evaluated

Bits from Your Board

Value Driven Project Planning (cont.)

- Gather Information using a variety of methods and sources to assure that all aspects are heard and considered.
- Evaluate the information considering benefits and risks
- Make decisions according to all applicable provisions in our Church Bylaws.

In complex situations, the Board may consider a Feasibility Study; defined as an examination of a situation to decide if a suggested method, plan, or piece of work is possible or reasonable. A Feasibility Study helps us to:

- Organizes information; Assures depth and breadth of data collection
- Improves Project Team Focus
- Aids decision making process, who decides, and by what criteria
- · Identifies valid reasons to proceed or not

¹ This provisional planning process will be reviewed upon the completion of a project for necessary revisions, improvements, and final adoption.



Sharing My Thoughts.....

"Why does everything goes into their mouths?" This is a question almost every parent of a young child asks. Putting everything in their mouth is the beginning of exploring the world around them. As they get older, play becomes more involved when exploring their world. Play is actually the child's way of understanding how life works. Through play, children learn to problem solve, develop empathy, understand another's point of view, to respect differences and much, much more.

Play is present all through childhood up through adults! It just changes in structure. For example, a preschooler can use a block for a pretend phone, a school age uses an actual phone, (not activated) to play with. An adult extends their phone play to the internet. Play is so important in child development. It allows children to express themselves and discover their authentic selves. Even at a very young age, self concept is critical.

I use to have a Tee shirt, when I taught preschool, that said, "My Work is Child's Play." My recommendation to you all, is to take a chance, play with a child and see what YOU can learn.

Dramatic Play this Month:

Exploring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr,'s dream, the children played in Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s restaurant "Connecting Hands." It is a restaurant where everyone was served.

Their doctor office encouraged the development of empathy and how it feels to nurture someone who is in need. Ramona thought all the animals and all the babies could come to her doctor

office "All Welcoming"

Building their cardboard box city took on a challenge of cooperation, learning another's perspective by sharing ideas. They explored how it felt to be a part of a community.

Happy Heart Circle Time- January Theme: Transformation

This month we explored the theme of transformation and change. We invited the children to think back to when they were babies and asked: "What can you do today that you couldn't do when you were a little baby?" We also had conversations about what they would like to be when they grow up. During our reflective service, we sat outside under a tree, and accompanied by drums, we played "I Spy with My Little Eyes."

For MLK Sunday, we talked about the meaning of segregation. The children engaged in a role play activity to learn about segregation in restaurants and made a mobile showing hands of all skin colors creating a human rainbow.

The service on Transformation was co-led by Nayela, Mireya, and Rev. Maria Cristina. Kudos to Mireya and Nayela for coming up with the idea, for being part of the planning process, and for their amazing creativity. Congratulations Mireya and Nayela for being such wonderful worship service leaders! We especially loved making the handprint butterfly and singing along with the song from Encanto: "Dos Oruguitas/Two Little Caterpillars."

In celebration of the Chinese New Year, we scared away the dragon with loud noises, (banging pots and pans), scaring away what frightens our hearts. Gift bags were delivered to the families including oranges, red envelopes with lucky coins, and art projects. For the younger children: a Chinese drum. For the older youth: a cherry blossom picture frame.


