The Board of Trustees met twice in March. At our invitation, PCD Executive Josh Searle-White attended our March 6th board meeting to help us sort out feelings and questions following Rev. Katie's resignation.

Josh guided us through the UUA Transition path and shared the benefits of an Interim Minister. We spoke openly about our choices and concerns. In closing, Josh gave us this advice; "Nothing has to happen immediately; the board should take some time to digest the news of Katie's leaving before deciding which path to take next".

The Board took the next two weeks to absorb the recommendations; talking to each other about our responsibilities to the congregation, sharing our hopes and fears.

It was at our next meeting that we came together to vote on the next steps. We held this special meeting knowing that we have a deadline of April 17th to apply for an Interim Minister. At this meeting, the board members present voted unanimously to hire an Interim Minister. We agreed that the work of an Interim Minister was too important not to consider.

The Board will ask the Committee on Ministry to work with us on the Interim application as well as forming the committee that will welcome and support our transition Minister. I will continue to update the blog on our web-site as things progress.


As a Leader, I do not have all the answers. I rely on the support from our board members, past and present to help guide me through these difficult decisions. My hope is that you all feel comfortable sharing your thoughts and concerns with members of our congregation as we move into the next generation of Starr King.

Other Board items that were approved:

- The Board voted to accept the Financial Review that was completed by Beth Ogilvie, Stuart Fink, and Frank Burton.
- Our Facilities Use Agreement was amended to add these words to Section D: In the event of injuries or accidents on church premises, user shall notify the church office by the next business day or as soon as possible.

The Committee on Ministry recommended inviting two new members. The board approved.

Many years ago, my wife, Rebecca, and I were sitting on a train in the Netherlands gazing out the window. It was springtime and acres and acres of crimson and golden tulips waved before us like whitecaps topping a stormy sea. Their uniform beauty was impressive. Somehow this remembered image stirs up in me the extended metaphor that churches are theological gardens or fields. A dogma based religion like the Catholic or Orthodox Church is like a Dutch field of tulips with its long history of religious art and systematic theology; a United Church of Christ would be similar to an sprawling English garden that permits some diversity of flora. Our UU churches are more akin to a wild grassland and oak forest where all kinds of flowers and trees and grasses flourish in a complex eco-system.

Of course there is beauty in both uniformity and diversity. I sometimes wish we at Starr King UU Church could more often and more deeply appreciate how awesome is our wild theological garden! We have our stately oaks maintaining our historical tradition of expansive love from our Universalist trunk and the unity of the Divine from our Unitarian side. We discover the abundance of aromatic lavender and mint and sage and fennel that burst forth among our Buddhist, Yogini, Pantheist and Wicca members. Finally, the native California grasses that flourish from our Western American tradition of free-thought humanism, agnosticism and atheism. What a wonderful richness here; truly a Garden of Earthly Delights!

APRIL RE THEME: Liberation and Renewal

Lesson learned from our month of spiritual practices in March: when doing a walking meditation with children, do NOT walk by the playground! There is much in our life, no matter how much power we may have, that we cannot control or influence--so much we simply need to accept. Or at least, it would be healthiest to accept! Such acceptance is not a passive process--it requires intention and practice. What should we accept? What should we fight? How many times would the children need to do their walking meditation past the playground before they would no longer be pulled by its magnetic lure? (Probably never!)

April is a time of rebirth and renewal—warmer weather and more daylight. Passover. Easter. Our liturgical calendar points us towards focusing on liberation and renewal. Caught up in our tasks of daily living, trying to be good parents, good adult children....what are practices in our life that can provide us with a sense of liberation and renewal? With the warm, dry weather, I know the children will be active in their spiritual practice of “playing on the playground.” What is your “playground” and how can you spend a little more time there?

New Jim Forsyth Foundation, Teams Up With South Hayward Parish to Provide, Expand Much Needed Homeless Services

Silvia Brandon-Perez has founded the Jim Forsyth Foundation, in memory of her husband and our beloved long time member. Jim and Silvia have worked for many years with South Hayward Parish/Hayward CAN and the first grant from the Foundation was in support of the new Joe White Movement. Silvia made a matching grant of \$3000.00.

With the generosity of the SKUU congregation and the larger Hayward Community an additional \$6000.00 was raised, doubling the match! A total of \$9000.00 from this grant will go to support the new Winter Shelter and the expansion of the Homeless Drop-In Center.

Joe White was a homeless resident of Hayward who died tragically from exposure during our extreme cold spell last December. Joe's family and friends have worked together with the SHP community to provide new homeless services in Joe's memory by forming the Joe White Movement/Fund.

For the first time this winter, on nights with severe weather, an emergency overnight shelter has been opened at the SHP Outreach Center on Patrick Avenue in Hayward.

Silvia was there, "On the second night we were open, we had thirteen guests at our small shelter, sharing conversation, soup, goopy peanut butter sandwiches, the occasional banana, water, coffee... I felt such gratefulness that at least the ones who had made it there would not die of exposure as Joe White had, that for a night we would make a difference in the lives of human beings with names, stories, jokes, loves, and needs."



This work is very personal to Silvia, "I was blessed by finally marrying my soul mate, a man who, though not a believer as defined in traditional religion, was a brilliant scholar and ardent practitioner of community and solidarity.

"In 10th grade I went to a Catholic retreat in the mountains of the Dominican Republic, and the priest repeated the words attributed to that great revolutionary, the man Jesus, about giving food to the hungry and drink to the thirsty, welcoming the stranger and dressing the naked one, caring for those who were ill and visiting the prisoner... For verily I say unto you, inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me... Jim always said solidarity is the best synonym for love. "

Silvia also works hard providing legal services to immigrant families through SHP. "I love the South Hayward Parish... Someday I hope to create a work about the organization, whose 50th year this is, to be called 'On a Wing and a Prayer,' what is used to create miracles such as this shelter. I am so very grateful to be a small part of it all."

labor rights and international solidarity.




