- The other group will be led by Heidi Green and Doug Sprague and start on Tuesday, October 7th at 7:00 PM, continuing the first and third Tuesday until June 2, 2015.

Small Group Ministry (SGM) promotes the mission of the church by offering small groups where members have the opportunity for deeper relationships with others and for a deeper exploration of life. It will offer a welcoming place to share our lives, to care for each other, to discuss important topics, and to increase our listening skills in an open and respectful setting, and to participate in a service project in the church or larger community.

To make the group a safe and nurturing place, members will agree to :

- a. honor the time together as an opportunity to put our UU values and principles into practice.
- b. make a commitment to attend the meetings.
- c. attend at least four meetings.
- d. listen deeply to one another and give each person equal time.
- e. make decisions as a group during the meeting.
- f. speak from their hearts and experiences, while avoiding the temptation to give advice, lecture, or preach.
- g. engage in some collective act of service.
- h. respect confidentiality.

Doyour part, be water smart

By now we all know that we are in the middle of a serious drought. 2014 is the second driest year in California's recorded history. The good news is that there are things we can do to get through the dry times while hoping for a wetter California in the future.

Starting in August, all EBMUD customers must:

- **Water outdoors in a way that prevents runoff in gutters, patios, walkways, driveways or streets. Limit the frequency of irrigation.**
- **Use a hose with shut-off nozzle if you wash your vehicle at home.**
- **Use recirculated, and preferably recycled water in fountains.**
- **Don't use potable water to wash sidewalks and driveways. If you must wash hard surfaces for sanitary reasons, use a hose with a shut-off nozzle.**

Cut your total water use by at least 10%.

MORE TIPS ON CUTTING BACK:

Use the ebmud.com WaterSmart Home survey kit to evaluate your home's water use and find leaks and inefficient fixtures.

Toilet and irrigation systems contain some of the biggest leaks. Find them and fix them.

Look for signs of irrigation leaks, overspray and run-off. Your lawn needs water only two days a week, shrubs and trees only one day this time of year.

Upgrade appliances and plumbing fixtures to water efficient models. EBMUD offers water conservation rebates to customers for toilets and washing machines.

Consider converting lawns to a sustainable landscape. Upgrade irrigation equipment to efficient drip systems and self-adjusting controllers. Rebates are available for single- and multi-family residences and commercial customers.

Climate Change March

Join us next month in taking action to support climate justice! Attend the People's Climate March in New York City on September 21 or find, support, or organize a related event in your area.

Climate change poses a threat to human rights in the United States and around the world. From women's empowerment to disaster recovery, from access to clean water to food sustainability, efforts to improve human rights are already being strained by climate change.

Many communities whose rights are already at risk — including low-income people, women, indigenous people, and people of color — often experience the greatest negative impacts of global warming and related processes like fossil fuel extraction.

As a human rights organization committed to working with marginalized people around the world, UUSC is deeply engaged in supporting communities responding to these global threats.

We invite you to join us in whatever way you can. In September, timed to coincide with the United Nations Climate Summit, there will be a mass mobilization in support of climate justice.

Here's how you can participate:

- If you are in the New York area (or can reach New York via sustainable modes of transportation): Participate in the **People's Climate March on September 21**. This may be the largest climate march in history, with an estimated one million people gathering in New York City. There are many events scheduled for the weekend, including a Saturday night interfaith worship service hosted by young adults and open to all, a massive interfaith service on Sunday morning before the march, and a gathering directly following the march at Community Church of New York, UU. RSVP for the march now!
- If you are not traveling to New York: Organize a local solidarity action or contribute to one that is already being planned. Be part of a demonstration, an educational activity, a letter-writing event, or any other gathering calling for effective global action to advance climate justice. In finding or planning local activities, consider how you can support communities in your own area that are most affected by the climate crisis and are leading efforts to respond. Learn more about participating in local action.
