# Report from the Board of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church (SKUUC); August 2017

For most of us it is a time for vacations and enjoying these warm summer days, hopefully with something cool to drink and good to eat after spending time in the sun. For the church, it is a time of both rest and transition as our minister is on vacation. Our new board met for the first time on July 6th (welcoming Jennifer Koney, Mary Lou Schuler, and Roy Dickerson into our ranks, and thanking departing members Betsy Dye, Stuart Fink, and Diana Dickerson). Many of us are on vacation so the church pews aren't quite as full but for those who are present the commitment and enthusiasm is not diminished. Those who are in lay leadership have taken the responsibility of continuing to provide meaningful services giving insights, challenges, and new experiences to our world view.

To the congregation, we both congratulate and thank you for the time, energy, love, and nourishment you so willingly give. It is our experiences that, while taking a toll, also enrich us. - The Personnel Committee, with Board liaison Sherry Thomas, is leading the search for, not one, but two pianists. They have successfully identified a summer pianist, and are still in search for a permanent one. Please let Sherry know if you have suggestions.
- Roy Dickerson and Heidi Green took on the role of monthly Chalice communication with all of you. Please let us know if there are other aspects of the Board you'd like to learn more about.

# What's New With FESCO? By Kathryn Lamar

- Thursday, July 20, FESCO dedicated the remodel of Les Marquis House with a reception featuring representatives from the City of Hayward, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, and Home Aid of Northern California. The remodel included a beautiful new kitchen, refinishing of the original hardwood floors that were not replaced, a gorgeously furnished family room, and replacement of an office (relocated to Greg Smith Center) with a new bedroom for a client family. All told, the \$40,000 remodel was accomplished by Home Aid at no cost to FESCO! Congratulations to all.
- At the SKUUC annual meeting and in our annual report, I noted that FESCO was beginning discussions with an undisclosed partner to explore a potential strategic alliance. Both Boards have now approved the discussions and have signed a memorandum of understanding for the process, so we can now divulge our potential partner—LA FAMILIA! The discussions are projected to last approximately six months, so by the end of the year we should be able to share the results and plans moving forward.
- The 2017 Shuffle raised close to \$56,000. Thanks to all participants and volunteers.
- The Backpack Drive culminates on August 19, at Eden UCC, when 100 backpacks provided by Life Chiropractic College will be custom-fit to their recipients (FESCO residents in K-12); the backpacks are filled with the necessary school supplies by volunteers from the participating groups and congregations—if you have not already signed up to fill a specific backpack and still want want to donate, just send money to Stephanie Miller at FESCO.
- Our own Felicia Quijano is working this summer on her Girl Scout Gold project—providing fun, science projects to FESCO residents on Wednesday evenings. I believe she has asked for help from any SKUUC volunteers, so please help if you can.
