# **Board Report, May 2018**

With our annual congregational meeting another church year has come full circle. Seems like a funny time of the year to be closing the books but it is also a time of new beginnings. Many thanks to those on the board and other volunteers who are leaving, staying and newly christened. For those who have given many hours and thoughtful service to the community we honor your efforts. The meeting was a chance for all of us to cast our votes for the new board, nominating committee members, and the budget for the coming year. One of the most unheralded groups is our budget committee; for those of us whose eyes glaze over when the columns of numbers get longer and longer we thank you and hope that you never abandon us. We gave our staff a raise that follows the UUA guidelines, but as anyone who pays rent or a mortgage knows this is a drop in the bucket. We live in one of the most desirable places on this planet and the prices reflect it. The availability of affordable housing has become the hot button issue for social justice as communities become gentrified and those who aren't already stakeholders are faced with longer commutes or forced to move away from the area. The board is considering using a portion of the church property as a manse or parsonage for our minister. This is in the preliminary stage of evaluation; it is an effort to look at our ability to make our church affordable for our minister as the costs of living here continue to rise. We are looking at all aspects of this as it is a big decision; our goal is to make our community sustainable into the foreseeable future while not destroying this link to the natural environment we enjoy.

We were reminded this month of the fragile nature of our existence by the loss of one of our dearest members. The service for Bob Stortz was a chance to say goodbye to one of the pillars of our community. Bob was a good friend to all who knew him. I enjoyed our "shop talks." We would talk about his time listening in on Russian broadcasts in Germany during the '50s and his early spy satellite work during the '60s. Bob started with the slide rule and bridged the gap in the digital revolution of punch cards, core memory, and mainframes, up to the miniaturized computers we have today. He was one the technical wizards who was often in the shadows but whose work brought us to where we are today. But Bob wasn't defined by his career; he was a great guy with a great sense of humor and values that made him stalwart of our community. We will miss you Bob; you were one of a kind.

Looking out the window there is drizzle today, and the threat of rain tomorrow, yet summer is upon us. Some of our members are already on trips and the kids are either out of school or soon will be. The board wishes you all a great summer and hopes to see you at church in between your vacation adventures.



# From the Minister

# The Poor People's Campaign









The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival is uniting tens of thousands of people across the country to challenge the evils of systemic racism, poverty, the war economy, ecological devastation, and the nation's distorted morality. Rev. William Barber, who co-chairs the campaign with the Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis, a pastor from New York City, hopes to sign up 1,000 people in 25 states and D.C. for a season of civil disobedience. Protesters will stage sit-ins at state capitols and in the U.S. Congress under a "moral agenda" encompassing a host of issues, from LGBTQ and voting rights to immigration reform and access to healthcare. "Some issues are not about left and right, Republican and Democrat – they're about our deepest moral values," says Barber. "And we believe that you have to have a campaign, a movement, that seeks to reshape the moral narrative."

On Monday, May 20, Starr King UU Church members traveled to Sacramento to participate in the Poor People's Campaign rally on the grounds of the Capitol building in Sacramento. It was an inspiring event with many charismatic speakers. I was grateful that the event began with a blessing and honor song from a collective of Native American people, followed by a powerful and beautifully diverse line-up of speakers who identified as Muslim, Chicanx, Latinx, Transgender, Two Spirit, Immigrant, and Black, among others.

At 4 pm we entered the Capitol building singing at the top of our lungs "We Shall Not Be Moved!" demanding to speak with Gov. Jerry Brown and present the following demands: A sweeping overhaul of our nation's voting rights laws, and policies to address poverty, ecological devastation and war economy.







California Highway Patrol officers began arresting protesters around 8:45 pm for refusing to disperse. Our own Rene Castle was among those arrested and spent the night in jail. Last Monday he had attended a special training on civil disobedience and was well prepared for his eventual arrest. We remained with him previous to his arrest, providing support and encouragement (and protein bars). We are grateful for his commitment to this movement and to social justice. Today (Tuesday, May 22) he was released and is on his way back to Hayward. Other Starr King UU Church members who support the Poor People's Campaign and who were in Sacramento: Frank Burton, Mary Shields, Mary Lou Schuller, Beth Ogilvie, Will Fitch, and Doris Wolf.

I continue to be inspired by lay leaders and UU Ministers who are showing up and becoming part of this vital and necessary growing national movement. Last week my colleague Rev. Josh Pawelek was arrested and shared with us these powerful words:

"Most people cannot risk arrest. I am in a very fortunate position in life. And since I am generally supported in my professional life -- both by the people I serve as minister and by my colleagues and denominational structure -- and since I am a straight, white, very privileged man -- I feel a certain obligation to take this risk on behalf of those who can't... I don't do this only on behalf of those who can't. I do it for myself too. Economic inequality impacts the communities that hold me, and thus impacts me. Racism impacts the communities that hold me, and thus impacts me. Environmental degradation impacts the communities that hold me, and thus impacts me. The distorted moral narrative in the U.S. impacts the communities that hold me, and thus impacts me. Interdependent web, yes? So, this is also for me and my family. I've got huge self-interest here. As Jesus makes abundantly clear, love of neighbor is modeled on love of self."

Beloveds, let us keep voicing our resistance and hope through our participation in the Poor People's Campaign. UUA President, Susan Frederick-Gray, is actively involved in the PPC and inspires us with her words:

"As people of faith and moral conscience, we must raise our voices and call on our elected officials to work for the good of everyone, not just the rich and privileged. I am proud to stand with the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival. Together, we will hold our leaders accountable as we create a nation – and a world – that is more just, more welcoming, more sustainable for all."
