Board Report

The board meetings are a place where the care and feeding of our physical church intersects with our religious exploration and social activism. One of our church members, Mike, visited the last meeting and it was great having his input and unique perspectives. The board and com would like to invite anyone who is interested in the nuts and bolts of our congregation to "come on down".

One of the things that we went over at the last meeting was tree trimming. If you look at the oaks and the buckeyes along the creek fence you will see that Walt oversaw a crew who worked hard to get our grounds in shape. Some of the limbs were hanging over buildings, a fire hazard, or just out of control. Thanks, Walt, for always keeping our grounds tip-top.

A big concern for us has been security for our people and property. Ray has been working on coming up with a security system that meets our needs but doesn't take up our whole budget. Ray has worked with a contractor to find a surveillance system with cameras, recorder, and alarm to monitor our grounds. Collin and Walt have worked at putting in a more secure latch on the front double-doors. We are also looking at ways to provide more light for the parking lot during night time events.

For those of you who attended Las Posadas last Sunday evening it was a rousing success. If you came away hungry it was your own fault as we had a great selection of soup, bread, deserts, song, and friendship. We had a lot of rain so the procession around the neighborhood was shelved this year in favor of and indoor Christmas Story and sing-along followed by a chance to break bread together.



The story of Christmas and searching for shelter is present this year as we are constantly reminded of those at our southern border searching for shelter. The board fully supports our minister who went to that border to stand up for those who have traveled so far and are without a place to call home.

As a congregation we support those who are less fortunate and have been amazingly generous.; the special plates for South Hayward Parish and other worthy causes are amazing reminders of how much we care. We who have been lucky enough to be born here, have enough to eat, a home, security, and celebrations to attend recognize how fortunate we are. RE Reflections

Theme: Possibility

Out with the Old; In with the New

As we approach the New Year, it is a good time to reflect on the past year, to let go of what did not work and to remain open to whatever comes next. Does your family have any New Year's rituals that allow for self-reflection and setting positive intentions for the year ahead? I would like to share with you an exercise from *Awakening Joy For Kids*, by James Baraz, which is a good example of how to set positive intentions by starting with what we don't want and figuring out how to change the negative into a positive.

Ask your child to divide a blank piece of paper into two by folding it in half. On one side have them write what they don't want in their lives and on the other side what they do want. Younger children can draw pictures, or you can write for them.

Children need to know they can share anything, and while you may not be able to fix or change things, you can listen without judgement. The more you build trust, the more they will share.

Start by sharing some of the things that you do not want in your life. Being vulnerable opens the way for them to be share honestly with you. For example, I might put under don't wants - Don't want my clothes to feel tight, don't want to feel stressed at work, don't want to feel lonely. Then ask them to write as many things as they would like on the don't side.

When they are done doing this show them how to change their negatives into positives.

Don't Want to Do Want:

Don't want my clothes to feel tight ----> Want to eat moderately & exercise regularly Don't want to feel stressed at work ----> Want to prepare early and meditate Don't want to feel lonely -----> Want to make new friends

Ask if there are any examples they are stuck on and help them learn the skill of turning negatives to positives.

When they are done, have them cut their papers in two. Put the **Do Wants** in a special place that will help them remember their intentions. Then come up with a ceremonious way to destroy the **Don't Wants.** You can shred them, burn them, ball them up and throw them away, etc. You might want to add some sort of chant such as, "I let go of the things I don't want in my life and open to what I do want." Have fun with it!! Make it your own! Have a Happy New Year!!

Age-ing to Sage-ing Series Continues

20 January 2019

12-2pm in the Sanctuary

Our third session on Sunday, 20 January will discuss The Eternity Factor by examining the perspectives of death and dying from a Buddhism, Judaism, and Christianity perspective. We'll discuss the impact of the death of family and friends. We'll look at Jung's elder archetype of the Crone and Earth Centered Traditions of the Grandmother Lodge.

While many people write a Last Will and Testament to deal with earthly possessions, we will explore the writing of an Ethical Will. Barry K. Baines, M.D., in his book, *Ethical Wills – Putting your Values on Paper, (2nd edition, 2006, Da Capo Life Long – a member of the Perseus Books Group)* describes the Ethical Will as an ancient custom of *passing on personal values, beliefs, blessings, and advice to future generations (pg. 1).* In his book he talks about asking his father to write an ethical will and its meaning for him. We'll use Baines work to provide a guide to the Why, When, and How, of writing an Ethical Will as well as his guidance in preparing, caring, for and sharing your Ethical Will. A discussion guide will be placed in the Community Room early in January

Invitation: Join the White Racial Literacy Book Group

1st and 3rd Mondays, 7:15pm, starting January 7th

Last spring, 12 white church members - including the 4-member executive committee and the white half of the Committee on Ministry - began meeting monthly to read and discuss Robin DiAngelo's book *What Does it Mean to be White: Developing White Racial Literacy*. When it started to look like we'd all die of old age before we finished the book, we switched to meeting twice a month. We are happy to report that we are nearly done! We plan to finish the book in November, then give ourselves December off.

For me, this group has been a form of **Small Group Ministry**. It's a committed group of people willing to discuss difficult topics honestly, and to help each other through the tough parts with kindness and understanding. I continue to be amazed and humbled and warmed by the dedication of the participants. And **it's not just a book group**. We talk about our culture, our church, and ourselves, and what it might look like if we were truly welcoming and inclusive.

In January we will start a new book, <u>Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity, and Power in</u> <u>Ministry</u>, **and we are opening the group to new members**. Some of our folks will be dropping out, and we'd love to have new people join us.

Centering is from Skinner House Books. The UUA Bookshop website says "A joint project of the Committee for Antiracism, Anti-oppression, and Multiculturalism of the UUMA [the UU Ministers Association] and Skinner House Books, Centering is the first book to center the stories, analysis, and insight of Unitarian Universalists of color offering their religious leadership." It continues:

The 2017-18 UUA Common Read

In October 2015, a group of distinguished UU religious professionals of color gathered together in Chicago to embark on a radical project. The conference was sponsored by the UUMA's Committee on Antiracism, Anti-oppression, and Multiculturalism. It started with the premise that discussions of race in Unitarian Universalism have too often presupposed a White audience and prioritized the needs, education, and emotions of the White majority. The goal was to reframe Unitarian Universalist anti-oppression work by putting the voices, experiences and learnings of people of color at the center of the conversation. The resulting book, Centering, captures the papers that were presented and the rich dialogue from the conference to share personal stories and address the challenges that religious leaders of color face in exercising power, agency, and authority in a culturally White denomination. Centering explores how racial identity is made both visible and invisible in Unitarian Universalist ministries.

If you are a white person interested in raising your consciousness about race and racism and creating a just and loving world, please join us.
