As I admire the beauty of new Spring blossoms, I am reminded that last year in March we closed our building and began to navigate the COVID pandemic as best we could. Despite all the fear and uncertainty, we regrouped and with great leadership and a core group of volunteers, we moved forward together. Since then, we have not skipped a beat and actually have been able to strengthen our connections. I feel so blessed and proud to be your minister, especially in these times. You have shown up in so many ways to make sure that everyone in our community feels included, connected, and cared for. As we approach this one year anniversary of the pandemic, I want to acknowledge the deep grief for so many lives lost to this pandemic. I also want to lift up and honor the many ways we have managed to maintain and breathe new life into our programs. I am grateful for our Board for their leadership, vision, and commitment to our health and safety above all else. While I miss seeing you in person, I know that part of loving you and ministering to you, is making sure that I do my very best to protect you and keep you safe. As I say every Sunday as we extinguish the chalice:

"We extinguish this flame, but not the light of truth, the warmth of community, or the fire of commitment. These we carry in our hearts, until we are together again...and I hope and pray that we can be together very soon."

In the meantime, we will continue to follow both Alameda County Public Health guidelines, as well as the UUA's recommendations:

"Because of our strong desire to connect once again in the sacred spaces of our congregational buildings, many congregational leaders have begun asking the UUA for guidance in decision-making about when and how to resume in-person programs and services. As your UUA leaders, who always serve in partnership with your own congregational leadership, we have articulated the following principles for thinking about when and how to go back. They are grounded in Unitarian Universalism's deep values:

- Our abiding care and concern for the most vulnerable, inside and outside our congregation.
- Accessibility and inclusion for all of our members and friends to participate in our congregation, regardless of health status, health vulnerability, or ability.
- Recognition that we are part of an interdependent web and, as such, our risk-taking and our protective actions affect far more than just ourselves. Our congregational decisions can impact other congregations and the wider community.
- Ethical treatment and expectations for our leaders and staff, minimizing the risks to their own health and well-being.
- Our affirmation that good science, coupled with our UU values, must be the basis upon which we make decisions about in-person gathering.
- Commitment to our mission, community, and theology more than ever, mindful of the spiritual demands of this transition.

In the midst of uncertainty, the UUA stands by our spring 2020 recommendation that congregations plan for ongoing virtual gathering and operations. This applies to worship, events, rites of passage, and more.

We strongly discourage smaller in-person gatherings (such as meetings or one-to-one pastoral care) in indoor spaces, even with masks. Even the best masks are not 100% effective in preventing the spread of the virus from person to person. Our values of safety and inclusion call on us to minimize risk. We do not always know who might be most vulnerable to being harmed, or killed, by this virus. And we do not want to place the burden of educating or correcting us on the people who are most vulnerable.

Our highest values and commitments call us to refrain from in-person gathering until the COVID-19 pandemic is controlled. We invite you to think of your congregation as primarily digitally-connected, with small in-person nodes that can grow as the pandemic subsides. Learn more about how you can embrace the opportunities presented by this time of virtual gathering.

Our recommendations for congregations are indeed more stringent than schools and businesses that surround you, for the following reasons:

- As a community that values inclusion and collective care, we don't want to create inperson situations that inadvertently exclude those at higher risk, or create situations that force those at higher risk to publicly identify themselves.
- Our decision-making must center the needs of the most vulnerable. The membership of most UU congregations is an older, more vulnerable population than the general public.

We are guided by science and our deepest values, not politics, when we urge congregations to not resume full in-person operations until concrete public health criteria are met."

Dr. Saulo Lewis has also been instrumental in program planning, focusing on the needs of new graduates as they enter the profession and self-care to improve the health of nurses. In the past several months, Dr. Saulo Lewis served Nu Xi as one of the lead negotiators helping Nu Xi to forge a collaborative venture with two other Chapters and Our Lady of Fatima University in the Philippines to offer programs for free CE credit through Zoom annually. This will help us to better serve over 800 members across Northern California and beyond. Also, Dr. Saulo Lewis is representing Nu Xi on the Region One Event Planning Committee where she will be a key speaker at the Conference in June 2022. Nu Xi is pleased to recognize her many contributions with the Diana Dunn Service Award.

UPDATE ON SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION TO VOTE ON AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS:

This meeting was held on Feb. 28 and all the proposed bylaws changes were approved by the congregation. Look for a report in next month's Flaming Chalice.

Dear Members of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church,

We had a lively, thoughtful, and respectful discussion with congregants on February 7 about the proposed bylaws amendments. The Board thanks all of you who participated! After our discussion, the Board considered and revised the proposed amendments to further clarify, among other elements, the quorum for the Board (now proposed: 50%), the term of the Nominating Committee (same as the Board: 2 – two-year terms), and the effective date for changing from a 10 member Board to a 7 member Board (if passed at our vote on Feb. 28, 2021, then for the election of this year/2021.) We've also added "Pastoral Care" to the list of "permanent" committees and removed the phrase that allowed the Board liaison to a committee to be the chair of that committee (because it is highly discouraged. Being a Board member is enough of a responsibility to take on!) You should have received a Constant Contact email notice already that included the full text of the revised proposed bylaws. If not, please contact me at <u>jkoney@comcast.net</u> and I will be sure and send you the revised version.

On Sunday, February 28, 2021 after service, there will be a SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION to vote on the revised, proposed amendments to the bylaws. We will be voting on the bylaws amendments in 3 sections: 1) Miscellaneous; 2) Nominating Committee section; and 3) Board of Trustees: number of members. In order to pass, amendments require a two-thirds vote of those active members present at the congregational meeting.

We look forward our members voting on the proposed amendments as we to continue to improve our business practices and operations, and work to better honor those who serve our Congregation.

ZOOM FATIGUE ANYONE?

I have to admit that my Zoom meetings are limited to one or two a week. However, recently, I've been on several all-day meetings and noticed I was tired. Was this Zoom fatigue? On Wednesday, I found a very interesting article in the East Bay Times entitled, *Research explains why you're wiped out: Zoom Fatigue.*

Author Lisa M. Krieger, summarizes research being conducted at Stanford University and reports the research of Professor Jeremy Bailenson, founding director of the Stanford Virtual Human Interaction Lab. This first of its kind peer reviewed article, was published recently in the journal Technology, Mind, and Behavior. Krieger describes the studies four major reasons for fatigue and some of the fixes that Bailenson proposes. The link to the full article is below and an executive summary follows:

[Note: I want to encourage your participation in all Zoom activities that our church has to offer. If however, you like others, have experienced Zoom fatigue, this information may be helpful to you.]

Reason One: We're too close for comfort – Everyone is staring at each other; your noticing backgrounds, our faces appear larger -

Solution:

- Exit out of full screen
- Use an external keyboard to create comfortable space

Reason Two: We really hate watching ourselves – After hours of self-gazing, we turn critical – the lighting, your hair style, sloppy shave -

Solution:

- Use the hide-self view
- Add your own photo

Reason Three: We're trapped in a chair which violates our basic nature – "Human beings are restless creatures"

Solution

- Using a camera farther away
- Turn off video get up move around move your body



Reason Four: We can't see body language, so it takes more energy to communicate – The normal ways of communicating verbally and non-verbally are not available. Having to nod or wait or not be sure if someone is finished speaking takes extra energy

Solution:

· Give yourself an "audio only break"

She concludes the article by saying that corporations, schools, and government entities are reaching out to the Stanford Group to measure Zoom fatigues and more importantly, to improve this method of videoconferencing. Finally, she provides the survey being used by Stanford to measure Zoom Fatigue.

We still include the "traditional" elements of our circle-casting the circle, honoring the spirits present by moving around the Medicine Wheel or cycling through the Dagara Five Elements, playing Rhythmic Naming or similar getting-to-know-you exercise-but then we expand our wings and go wherever the spirit takes us.

I (Kathryn) have now attended several training events sponsored by Music For People (MfP), and am about to start my third series of classes on playing the Native Americanstyle flute as a spiritual practice, which is based on many of the same principles as MfP, so I'm very excited to introduce these principles to our rhythmic event. Here are some of the practices we are taking on:

- These events feature community music-making-in-the moment, not individual performance.
- There are no wrong notes
- There are no mistakes
- There is a place for everyone in the circle
- We come with varying experiences with music and life, but respect all those present
- We are free to find our place in the circle with whatever instrument or found object we bring, and free to play with any element of music--Rhythm, Melody, or Harmony--or any combination thereof.
- During any exercise or rhythm, people take their time to shine (should they desire), then allow others the same privilege.

Yes, this is vastly different from the musical events you may be accustomed to, but whether we recognize it or not, Music Is Our Birthright. So come and claim yours!

Here is the Zoom invitation for our March meeting–I look forward to sharing rhythm with you.
