Announcements

100K Trees for Humanity Introduces Hayward Tree Planting Project

Amos White, Founder and Chief Planting Officer for 100K Trees for Humanity, introduced the Hayward Tree Planting Project to the Starr King UU community after service on Sunday, October 23.

Amos created 100K Trees in 2019 as a community climate action response to America's withdrawal from the Paris Agreement. Since then, 100K Trees has planted more than 450 trees and formed partnerships with Sierra Club, American Forests, Cal Haas School of Business and others.

Amos presented the CA Urban Greenbelt Initiative to plant 433 CA communities by 2030 and introduced the Hayward Tree Planting Project. This project is environmentally justice centered and will ultimately plant over 340,000 trees in order to restore our tree canopy to 92% and improve our air, health, and well-being.



Starr King UU Church has been invited to participate. The Hayward Tree Planting project is forming and developing action teams around growing trees, mapping planting sites, and involving school and members of the community in planting and caring for trees as a direct climate action to help cool the planet.

Unhoused justice

Several members of the congregation went to the Cob on Wood community in west Oakland multiple times with concerns about Caltrans breaking up the encampment without viable alternatives for the residents.

SKUU Rainbow flag – Darryl Ray

Our Starr King UU pride flag has gone missing, and PJAT was asked to facilitate purchasing a new one. Rather than replacing it with an identical style flag, the group explored whether we could have a flag that was even more inclusive than the old one.

As a result, we have replaced it with the Intersex-inclusive Pride Progress Flag. This is the same flag that the Castro Valley Unified School District has chosen to be displayed on murals at all its schools. Along with the original Pride Flag's rainbow colored horizontal stripes there are five arrow shaped bands of black, brown, light blue, pink and white. The black and brown colors represent marginalized LGBTQ people of color, as well as those living with AIDS/HIV and those who have died from AIDS/HIV complications. The light blue, pink and white represent the transgender community. The yellow triangle and purple circle's colors were picked specifically to avoid "referencing gender stereotypes, like the colors pink and blue". The circle, which is unbroken and unornamented, symbolizes wholeness and completeness, and intersex people's potentialities.



PJAT Action Alerts (text messages)

We now have a texting service that enables us to send text alerts to a list of subscribers. There are 34 people on our list. If you're not already receiving these alerts, you can <u>sign</u> <u>up here</u>. This is not a group text so you won't see replies from anyone, just the one text with the message, and you can unsubscribe at any time by replying STOP. We will use this service to send notices of urgent upcoming events- demonstrations or rallies in the next few days, legislative alerts where urgent phone calls are needed, etc.

Land Acknowledgment

In October, the board decided to give management of the land acknowledgement content and process to the Minister and PJAT together. Any changes to the land acknowledgement will be discussed in an open forum announced at least one week ahead of time so all interested people may attend.

The boys returned and had decided to move some of the pumpkins. Drake had thought no, the pumpkins should stay where they are. More discussion took place and they all agreed on a compromise, some would remain and some could be moved.

Now, what just happen here under our noses? Lots. A community was created, roles and responsibilities were assigned, the power of decision making was equally distributed, problem solving with respect and a challenge to gender determined roles, (a girl king!). Children learn through play and if we all paid attention, I bet adults learn through play too.

Circle Time
