Congregational Conversations & Cottage Meetings

Hello lovelies. On we go, after a beautiful Season of Stewardship, into more Cottage Meetings and Congregational Conversations, doing the work of this interim time for you.

April cottage meetings are just around the corner. The question for April is: Does Starr King want a Fellowshipped UU Minister after the interim time? This is actually a complex question, and it certainly will NOT be definitely decided by the end of our Congregational Conversation on Sunday, April 16th. This is interim work for you, beloveds. To think through substantive questions, in community, in conversation with each other. April is the beginning of this conversation, which will continue in different forms over the coming



year. Part of your interim work is looking deeply at who you are as a congregation, what the word "community" means to you (the highest value that emerged from January cottage meetings).

This month, we will focus particularly on the anti-racism, anti-oppression and multicultural awareness work that all citizens are called to engage with. How do we become multiculturally competent, in order to engage in productive conflict within the community. Anti-racism work is all about asking questions, staying grounded in love, looking within, recognizing that we have all been born into a system – the dominant culture – that perpetuates sexism, racism, and ableism with a "power over" orientation, rather than a "power with" orientation.

No one has a guidebook on how to be ultimately successful in this work of <u>dismantling</u> <u>the white supremacy culture</u> in which we all swim. We are called by our UU principles to "free and responsible search for meaning" in our communities. I believe we are called to recognize love as the grounding guiding principle – not a sweet and sugary and saccharine love, but a love that burns with the fire of commitment. Commitment to that more just and beautiful world we all know is possible.

This month, the sign-ups for the Cottage Meetings will be low-tech. The four facilitators will be carrying a clipboard with them on Sunday, and below you will find their contact information, to let them know if you are signing up for their meeting. A maximum of eight (other than the facilitator(s)) will be managed, to keep these meeting small and relational. Then, we will all gather for the larger Congregational Conversation on Sunday, April 16th.

This question, **Does Starr King want a Fellowshipped UU Minister after the interim time?** Here is the text we will be considering, which is standard language in UU contracts for Interim Ministers:

1.5 Anti-Racism, Anti-Oppression and Multicultural Awareness:

The Board and the Minister commit to addressing the systemic prejudices and biases found within all parts of society. This work includes ensuring that the Minister(s), staff, and members are trained to understand, welcome, and better serve an increasingly diverse community.

The Board and Interim Minister will continually address the ways that systems of oppression within and beyond our Congregation are perpetuated and agree to collaborate on a joint process of reflection to ensure progress. This includes, but is not limited to, the ways in which the characteristics of dominant cultures live in our practices, systems, procedures, and lives.

This does not lend itself to a simple yes or no answer at this point. There are many options, many implications of the choices you will make, as you call your next minister. These April cottage meetings and Congregational Conversation around this question is a conversation, part of your work during this interim time. I encourage you to directly contact one of the four facilitators and sign up for one of the Cottage Meetings. As in January and February, I know you will experience community, as you wrestle with substantive questions of our time.

ICJJ holds Annual Retreat at Starr King

On February 25th leaders in the Interfaith Coalition for Justice in our Jails (ICJJ) held our annual retreat at Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church. We met to plan initiatives for the remainder of 2023. The feeling in the room was that it was time well spent. We had the opportunity to get grounded in the criminal legal system and the jail we are trying to impact, identified some new opportunities for change, and created four groups which will meet soon to flesh out initiatives for this year.

Twenty-six people attended the retreat, including – happily – almost one-third of the folks new to ICJJ. Because the system surrounding Santa Rita Jail is so complex, we set up a buddy system so that the "oldies" could integrate the "newbies" more easily into the group.

Faith congregations and organizations represented included: Faith in Action East Bay, Starr King UU Church, Kehilla Community Synagogue, Montclair Presbyterian Church, Skyline Community Church – United Church of Christ, Plymouth United Church of Christ, First Unitarian Church of Oakland, Imani Community Church, Interfaith Council of Alameda County, St. Columba Catholic Church, Lighthouse Mosque - Oakland, Lakeshore Ave Baptist Church, Temple Sinai – Oakland, Urban Strategies Council, Full Acts Gospel Church – Oakland, and the Berkeley Friends Meeting (Quaker)

Our Intended Outcomes for the retreat were:

- We are grounded in our vision, mission and what makes ICJJ unique
- We have increased our understanding of and insight into the systems we are trying to impact
- We have generated and fleshed out 3 to 5 initiatives for 2023
- We understand the gap between our aspirations and our current capacity and have generated ideas on how to address the gap

After getting grounded in who we are and the problems we are trying to address, we broke into four groups to dive deep into these areas of the system and to brainstorm solutions (or possible ICJJ "initiatives"):

- 1. District Attorney and Public Defender
- 2. Santa Rita jail
- 3. Behavioral/Mental Health and the Justice System

The groups came up with 12 different initiatives. We then took the temperature of the group to see which initiatives were a good fit for ICJJ and where the personal passion was, and there was support for nearly all of the initiatives! Rather than artificially limit our options at this early stage, we decided to have people sign up to participate in initial group meetings to clarify the initiatives and prepare proposals which would be presented at our March meeting.

Group	Description
Stop Deaths in Our Jail	A public campaign to raise awareness and put pressure on elected officials
DA, etc	Prosecution and Court Processes that – among other outcomes – would help limit size of the jail population
Jail Conditions	A wide range of possibilities, from continued concern about Covid transmission to program and other re-entry preparation.
Care First (CFCC)	Involvement in the CF Community Coalition, to win adequate budget for community-based behavioral health services
ICJJ Functions	How do we build systems and capacity to keep the organization functioning well?

The groups include four focused on impacting the system and an additional one on ICJJ functional areas such as outreach and communication:The planning committee worked closely with ICJJ member Susan Burns to design the retreat. We are so grateful to Susan for her facilitation and other skills!

Thanks also to Jean Moses who assisted Susan and Jo Bauen who led our opening and closing circles; to Payton Silket, Faith in Action East Bay's liaison to ICJJ, who opened our session with a powerful Faith in Action moment and opening prayer; to Bob Briton, his wife Terri, and logistics team members Betsy King and Nancy Taylor for facilities arrangements and meals; and to Rev Ruth Rinehart and Starr King President, Roy Dickerson who offered Starr King church for our event.

Year Round Stewardship

You know how we observe Black History Month, Women's History Month, and so forth, and at the same time really every month needs to be Black History Month, and every month needs to be Women's History Month? Well, we just finished our Stewardship Season, and guess what: It's not over. Every season is Stewardship Season.

We marked this past month as a sacred time in our Unitarian Universalist calendar, a time when we formally renew our commitment to our beloved church community, past, present, and future, by renewing our financial commitments. Without these financial commitments we wouldn't have a church. At the same time, *stewardship* is so much more than money. Stewardship is about helping with worship, or RE, or hospitality, or governance. It's about washing dishes and pulling weeds. It's about connecting, and growing together. Here is my final report from this past Stewardship Season, in case you missed it in the Announcements email:

We wrapped up our Stewardship Season on March 26 with a beautiful service and a fabulous potluck lunch. Many thanks to everyone who contributed to our stewardship efforts this spring! I want to especially thank:

- Rev Ruth, for her warm and inspiring leadership, and especially for believing the impossible that visiting everyone was vital and that it was something we could do.
- The Stewardship Leads and Visiting Stewards team- Roy, Mileva, Terri, Keith, Rev Ruth, Mary Lou, Claudia, and Rene
- The fabulous testimonial givers- Terri, Roy, Stephanie, Lorie, Joanna, and Keith
- Everyone who contributed to the potluck! Setting up tables, decorating them, organizing everything, bringing food, cleaning up – and especially Mileva, the chief organizer.
- And everyone who welcomed a visiting steward into your home or met with them some other way!

The pledge total was not what we'd hoped. It's \$154,580 at the moment, well short of what we'll need for next year's budget. It might go up a few thousand more, but that's pretty much it for now. But that's only part of the picture. Financially we're blessed with substantial savings, and the plan is to use some of our savings for this rebuilding time, planning for a robust future in which the church thrives and grows. The finance committee is working on next year's budget, and they'll be in touch about that before the annual meeting in May.

Of the 58 pledges we have, 10 are the same as last year and 39 went up. This means 84% of us at least maintained our pledges, and 2/3 of us actually increased them. This is a powerful vote of confidence in the church and the future of the church. We also strengthened our connections with each other with all the stewardship conversations. Thank you all for receiving us so warmly and sharing your time, your thoughts, your feelings so generously. And your money too!

To me, all these intangibles combine to make this year's Stewardship Season a great success.
