## From the Minister

## **Rev. Ruth Rinehart**

Beautiful Starr King, our time together draws towards its ending, on July 15th. This is my last Flaming Chalice article for you. I have recommended this article to you before, and I encourage you again to read <u>After Running Through the Thistles the Hard Part</u> <u>Begins</u>, by Rev. Dr. Mark D. Morrison-Reed, in his 2000 Berry Street Lecture. This is a series of ministers speaking to other ministers; it is open to the public as well.

This essay describes so poignantly the relationship of the minister to the congregation: the minister is replaceable. The congregation remains while ministers come and go.



One of the sections is entitled: You Will Love Your Parishioners With All Your Heart But Never Befriend Them. This is the "cruel irony," that ministers can be "friendly but not friends." In the age of Facebook, several of you have "friended" me, and sadly, I will unfriend all of you on July 15th. That is a parting ritual I do not relish. This is part of the ethical covenant that my colleagues have crafted in order to best support one another. Departing ministers honor this boundary because we care so deeply for the congregations we are leaving that we want to ensure there is emotional and practical space for the new ministry to take root and grow. I trust in your upcoming two years with the Rev. Elizabeth Sollie. I will no longer be your minister.

The most important relationships are between you and the other congregants. Yes, you are in a search for a new settled minister. And, the ministries of all ministers come to an end. Each individual ministry is mortal.

Mary Oliver's poem "In Blackwater Woods" describes what is required:

"To live in this world you must be able to do three things: to love what is mortal, to hold it against your bones knowing your own life depends on it, and, when the time comes to let it go, to let it go."

You are a shining star, Starr King! What a beautiful time I have been gifted with you, in this past church year. I will leave soon, but you will always be in my heart, and I will also always be a part of Starr King UU Church. I treasure this time we have had, this connection. I trust in your future.

## What happened at General Assembly?

**The UUA has a new President!** The delegates resoundingly affirmed the selection of **Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt** as the next president of the UUA, with 2320 delegates, or 95.5%, voting for her. She ran unopposed because the other candidate dropped out when they saw who they were running against! Her <u>campaign statement</u> is worth reading. I think she'll be fabulous. I've admired her for years.

**The revised Article II Proposal was approved,** with some amendments, for more consideration and final vote next year. 86.3% of the delegates voted yes. This does not guarantee a 2/3 majority next year, but does indicate a strong interest in staying in the conversation. Of the 13 amendments considered, the ones that involved keeping parts

of the 1985 language intact (ie the existing principles and sources) were voted down, all by 70% or more, a sign that a strong majority of the delegates are ready to move forward. The new draft Article II with the approved amendments hasn't been released yet. We'll share the link when it is.

The divestment proposal put forward by UU Young Adults was voted down. This was to divest the UU Common Endowment Fund of all fossil fuel stocks and use the funds generated for reparations. Our PJAT team helped get this proposal on the GA agenda, not because we were certain it was a good idea as stated, but because we were certain the young people deserved a hearing. They deserved to have their proposal given serious consideration. Rev. Sofia, in an interview, was asked if she supported this proposal. Her clear strong answer was that she absolutely supports the goals of the proposal -- she's an environmental ethicist -- but she didn't support the language of the proposal as written. She promised to work with the young people on this effort. After the discussion of the proposal in the general session, the young people staged a demonstration.

There was lots more at GA, but these are some of the highlights. As the UUA makes documents and recordings available, we'll pass them along.
