

The Board as Learners Fall and Winter Quarter Read

This Fall/Winter quarter the Board will read: *Let's Talk About Race (and Other Hard Things)* by Nancy A. Dome, EdD. Published in 2022, Dr. Dome chronicles her own experiences as a black woman college student driving home from a party with three white men and how differently they were treated when arrested for what the accuser knew was a prank. The disparity: yes, she was strip searched and they were not and her bail was higher than theirs. She goes on to address how she came to write the book and more importantly, to open us to a new way to

talk about difficult things. It's a post January 6th read and offers us much on how to LISTEN to the OTHER and how not to demonize the other.

Dr. Eddie Fergus in the Foreword, writes:

Rather than trying to label someone as wrong, shame them, or prove your point, the goals (of Compassionate DialogueTM is to understand one another and then come to a resolution together.

Dr. Fergus ends the forward with these words:

We want to do our part to repair a complicated history of oppression and its ripple effects and we see dialogue as the best tools for the job.

I started to read the book before the Democratic National Convention and now am struck by how prescient was our decision to read this book now. I have to confess that there are times when I'm impatient with a murder mystery or a combined mystery/romance novel and go to the final pages to read the end. So, I did it again – the final chapter is titled: *Why should we move forward with urgency?*

She writes:

- We can't go back!
- We're at an inflection point!
- We can't languish in the status quo!
- Division takes a toll on humans- making us unhappier, lonelier and less secure

Her notion of interrupting with compassion and ultimately, the repairing of what's broken is an invitation – an invitation to learn a new way to have that "difficult conversation" without guilt, blame or shame. Imagine that? Dr. Dome walks us through "difficult conversations" using Compassionate Dialogue and the RIP Protocol™ which has three components:

- Recognize It Notice/Identify the feeling, stop reacting, start responding
- Interrupt It Share a response Ask an open-ended question
- Repair It What happens next what will be done to heal, in a day, in a week, or a month

Imagine having a new way, the RIP Protocol to respond to statements like these?

• I never would have guessed you were gay.

- Women shouldn't be leaders. They're too emotional.
- She's so unprofessional. She must be a millennial.
- Those immigrants are taking our jobs.
- It was a joke! Don't be so uptight.
- You're too pretty to be a lesbian.
- Your name is too hard to pronounce. Can I just call you _____?
- I'm not a racist. I have Latino friends.

What is the Service Auction?

How do I make an donation?
