From the Minister

For our first sessions, the Creating Theology Together Class participants have been working on their personal theologies. The creators of the class suggest a framework for thinking about some of what might go into a personal theology. The framework consists of a central orienting idea and then four window panes.

The four window panes include;

- 1. Sin or missing the mark—How do I lose connection to my orienting idea?
- 2. Salvation or redemption—How do I regain connection with my orienting idea?
- 3. Community—How do my relationships, especially in my faith community, relate to/support/negate my orienting idea?

4. Purpose and meaning—To what end do I focus on this orienting idea? What is the ultimate purpose of this idea?


If you grew up in a Christian tradition, you might easily see how this framework is influenced by that way of understanding the world. God is the central orienting idea. The Bible has a lot to say about sin (a severing of relationship with God) and salvation (redemption through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ). The community is the body of Christ and the telos—or ultimate purpose-- is to be reconciled with God.

If you have a Buddhist orientation, however, you might say the orienting idea is compassion (you could go several ways). Sin, or missing the mark would be an absence of compassion or excessive attachment and aversion. Salvation is getting in touch with your own Buddha nature. In community you might engage in the Brahmaviharas (the four faces of love), the eightfold path and the four Noble truths for guidance. The telos, or final purpose is enlightenment and release from suffering.

Perhaps you have love as your central orienting idea. Missing the mark is anything that goes against love. Redemption is restoring relationship. Our ultimate purpose is to live in right relationship within the interdependent web and to create more love. Stephen Prothero, in his book God is Not One, organizes the major world religions by their central challenge and adherents' response to that challenge. The UU minister, Kelly Dignan posits that for Unitarian Universalists the central problem is disconnection and the response is connection and wholeness through covenant.

Process Theology might say the central organizing idea is the universe becoming through relationship. Religious Naturalism might suggest the central organizing idea is the interdependence of all of the natural world/cosmos. There are lots of ways to think about your central organizing idea. What most essentially informs how you live in this world?

In class, we talked about what we were taught as children about the central organizing idea. Many of us have rejected what we were taught as children and replaced it with something else. Some of us have not articulated that something else, maybe not even to ourselves. So, I'd like to extend this invitation beyond the class. What is your central orienting idea and how does it inform your thoughts about missing the mark, redemption (or restoring covenant), community or relationships, and the meaning and purpose of your life? What else does your central organizing idea inform about the way you live?

Updating Our Vision

About five years ago, our current vision – *Theologically Diverse, Radically Inclusive, and Justice Centered* – was provisionally approved by the board for use on a postcard inviting the neighbors to attend our special events in December. We liked this vision so we kept it. Two years ago we had cottage meetings to identify our shared values, and came up with Community, Love, and Spirituality as the top three.

Now we're launching an outreach initiative, and we believe that updating the vision to be more in line with our stated congregational values will also appeal more to the kind of people we want to attract. We want to try this new vision on for a while and see how we like it.

Our new vision: Spiritually Alive, Lovingly Inclusive, and Justice Centered

"Theologically Diverse" is absolutely true, and even 20 or 30 years ago it was a big draw for UU churches. When there was pressure to attend church, finding one that offered freedom from religious dogma was a gift. But with that pressure gone, people who want religious freedom today just stay home. People looking for a church now, studies show, are hungry for spiritual connection and inspiration, and spirituality is one of our top three values. "Spiritually Alive" speaks to that.

"Radically Inclusive" might be a good goal for us in the future, but what does it really mean? We can all picture "Lovingly Inclusive," and it brings in our top values of Community and Love.

We like the changes a lot. We like them because they are both descriptive (this is who we are) and aspirational (how can we do them better?)

We recognize the importance of congregational input and selfdetermination, and hope we can have a congregational visioning & missioning process later this year, perhaps in the spring. In the meantime, we think this change will help our outreach initiative, as well as how we see ourselves, and we ask your support in this. Try it on! How does it feel? Asking ourselves questions like "How can we be more lovingly inclusive?" might be transformative for us.

We also realized each style has strengths and challenge and to be more mindful as what style is most appropriate in a given situation. In November, we will learn more about a technique developed by Dr. Dome to address the "ouch" moments we encounter. In many ways, it is similar to what we learned in our Healthy Conflict series; it's a tool called the RIR Protocol which is a bigger part of Compassionate Dialoguetm. It is a strategy to encourage to engage other. Simply put: R = Recognize it; I = Interrupt it, R = Repair it

Blending of the "Futures Team" and the Membership Team

We approved the formation of the Membership and Growth Team naming Ben Ogilvie and Keith Lewis as coordinators and include Tanya Webster, Director of Religious Education and the Rev. Elizabeth Sollie.

Other Actions:

- Visibility Project: Working with the recommendation from Mary Lou Schuler's membership team the Board approved the purchase of numerous items to enhance our visibility at community events such as a fitted tablecloth with our logo, a canopy, assorted materials and racks for display.
- **Update our website** as it is the most common way in which people search for a spiritual community beginning with statement such as: Starr King UU Church is:
- 1. A warm and inclusive faith community serving Hayward and the East Bay
- 2. A thriving spiritual community, welcoming people of all faiths or none, united by our belief in the power of love in action
- 3. New Vision: Spiritually Alive, Lovingly Inclusive, and Justice Centered
- 4. An LGBTQ+ friendly community working for justice in Hayward and the East Bay since the 1950's
- Approved our including a separate "fund-a-need" to defray costs for membership outreach/growth and inclusion.
- Flying the American Flag: We agreed that the American Flag would be displayed on the Sunday nearest Memorial Day, Flag Day,

4th of July and Veteran's Day and we reviewed the accepted rules for flying the flag.

- Approved updates to the UUA Retirement plan
- Approved looking for a Dental Plan as required by the minister's contract
- Reviewed draft proposal to increase church/room rental rates
- Reviewed one bid to replace steps leading to the cottages; seeking a second




Lone Star

Lone Star is director Jon Sayles' masterpiece film rated in the top 10 westerns ever filmed by the American Film Institute (AFI).
